LOCAL AND MISCELLANEOUS.

—Rev. Elliot will preach in the Presbyterian Church, on Sunday next morning and evening. Sabbath School at 3 o'clock P. M.

—A well is to be put down on the Wm. Cropp farm, in Green Twp., and the timbers for the rig are being taken out. A gentleman named Collier has charge of the enterprise.

—Mr. J. T. Brennan is about to order some hard coal. Any parties needing hard coal can get it at reasonable figures by applying to him immediately.

—Messrs. J. and A. Bonner, of Stoneboro, made a flying visit to our town yesterday. Both are looking hearty, and report business very fair at their place.

—D. W. Clark, successor to C. C. Thompson, in the Tidouite Insurance Agency, was in town yesterday, looking after his business here. He will undoubtedly make a popular agent, and do a good business.

—Our ice houses are yet empty, and fears are entertained that they will remain so unless ice is shipped in from a distance. It is better to hold on awhile, however, and see if we don't get a big freeze before spring opens.

—From Mrs. Heath we learn that Mr. Jas. Dimond, her father, an old citizen of this place, is at present lying very ill at the house of his son-in-law, Mr. Siverley, at Siverleyville. What the nature of the illness is we are not informed.

—The County Commissioners have levied 7 mills county, and 2 mills bond tax for the current year. The tax last year was 10 mills county and 24 mills bridge tax. This is a reduction of a little more than one-fourth of the tax, and would indicate careful and intelligent management of county matters by the present board.

—The Free Pipe Line bill has been indefinitely postponed by the Senate, the opponents of the bill believing that this action would practically kill it, for this session, at least. The friends of the bill, however, will use their utmost endeavors to put it thro' the House at once, and then concentrate their energies on the Senate. It is hardly probable that the bill will pass this winter.

—A week from to-morrow is St. Valentine's Day, and then look out for colored pictures which will tell you what you look like, with some lines underneath which will tell you what the individual who sent it thinks of you and your character. It is useless to rave over these things. Of course the day is taken advantage of by one's enemies to annoy him, but as it is always done anonymously, it is better to take it cool.

—Wm. Reck, at his job on Sugar Run, is taking out some very fine timber. Last week he took out a stick of pine 30 feet long, 33 inches face, and 31 1/2 inches deep, no knot on the face. The stick contains 216 5/16 feet cubic measure, or 2597 1/2 feet board measure. The tree was broken in falling, or we suppose there would have been a beautiful stick of timber taken out from it, probably sixty feet in length.

—We acknowledge the receipt from Mr. Peter Shugert, of a complimentary ticket to the Skating Rink at Tidouite. The ice in the Rink is now in splendid condition, and those who understand the art of skating can find no more pleasant or healthy method of enjoying an hour or two. We would recommend our people, especially those who are skaters, to call at the Rink, if they visit Tidouite this winter.

—Our young people seem to be making the most of the present run of sleighing. We have heard of but one general "upset," and that occurred to a party which went out to Stewart's Run to a singing school last Saturday evening. Nobody was hurt. Teamsters and lumbermen are also taking advantage of the snow, and staves and coal are coming in, freight is going out, and lumber and timber are being moved as rapidly as teams can be got to do it. Our weather prophets do not seem to place much reliance on groundhog, but prophecy that the snow will not remain long with us.

Hickory Correspondence.

HICKORY, Feb. 5th, 1878.
ED. REPUBLICAN:—Dear Sir,—It is quite unnecessary to tell you that we have plenty of snow now; and the groundhog in our favor for six weeks' continuance of the same. Our busy citizens who are in the timber and lumber trade each wear a glowing smile when perched upon a stick of timber, en route for the river at a "two-forty" rate of speed. About half the usual amount of logs will be drawn to the mills. Hence a large falling off in boards and manufactured lumber for the next spring's market.

Esq. C. H. Church is confined to his room with a gash cut in his foot.

Religious revivals have closed here, about seventy pilgrims having renounced the teachings of Canon Farrar and Henry Ward-Tilton,—and have taken a matter-of-fact position and most strenuously insist that there is a "hell," and have forced "Auld Klotie" from his stronghold on Hickory to Whig Hill. At the latter place it is said that he encountered "Brother Stone," of the M. E. persuasion, who again gave him battle, capturing many of his "armor-bearers," who have already opened their batteries on their old and trusty leader, and he will probably be driven to Red-Hot or Clarion County before this reaches your many readers.

By the way, Brother Stone fled exceptions to the biblical views of Henry Ward B., and claimed that if the views or allegations of the several able pulpiter orators had to be met that it might as well come now as any time, and that he was ever ready to combat such fallacies set up by "learned men" against the long and strong chain of evidence so often set forth in the sacred scriptures. His arguments were clear, forcible and logical. He also claimed that the same ideas had been smoldering in the church for some time, while some ministers were deviating from preaching "Christ crucified" and were preaching on the side of the latter day refinements, which he held up in holy horror to the good common sense of his congregation, &c., &c.

Your correspondent is of the opinion that if he was a pupil, it would be better to "trim closely," but would repeat after old Solomon, "don't spare the rod to spoil the child." As there were no bones broken it remains now to be seen whether parents, directors, teacher or children will hold the fort. We will report results in due time.
