The Silver Bill Passed.

Bland's Silver Bill passed the Senate on Saturday last by a vote of 48 to 21, and only wants the President's signature to become a law. Senators Cameron and Wallace of Pennsylvania voted for the bill The following is the full text of the bill as passed:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That there shall be coined, at the several mints of the United States, silver dollars of the weight of 4121 grains troy, of standard silver, as provided in the act of January 18, 1837, on which shall be the device and superscription provided by said act, which coins, together with all silver dollars heretofore coined by the United States of like weight and fineners, shall be a legal tender at their nominal value for all debts and dues. public and private, except where otherwise expressed and stipulated in the contract, and the Secretary of the Treasury is authorized and directed to purchase from time to time, silver bullion at the market price thereof, not less than two million dollars' worth per month, nor more than four million dollars' worth per month, and cause the same to be coined monthly, as fast as so purchased, into such dollars, and a sum sufficient to carry out the foregoing provision of this act is the Courts of Common Pleas in actions hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated. And any gain or seigniorage arising from this coinage shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury as provided under existing laws relative to the subsiding coinage; Provided, that the amount of money at any one time invested in such silver bullion, exclusive of such resulting coin, shall not exceed five million dollars; and provided further, that nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize the payment in silver of certificates of deposit issued under the provision of section 254 of the revised statutes.

Section 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Section 3. That immediately after the passage of this act, the President shall invite the Governments of the countries composing the Latin Union, so called, and of such other European nations as he may deem advisable, to join the United States in conference to adopt a common ratio between gold and silver for the purpose of establishing internationally the use of bimetallic money, and securing fixity of relative value between those metals; such conference to be held at such place in Europe, or in the United States, at such time within six months, as may be mutually agreed upon by the executives of the governments joining in the same, whenever the governments so invited or any three of them shall have signified their willingness to unite in the same. The President shall, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, appoint three commissioners, who shall attend such conferences on behalf of the United States, and shall report the doings thereof to the President, who shall transmit the same to Congress. Said Commissioners shall each receive the sum of \$2,500 and their reasonable expenses, to be approved by the Secretary of State; and the amount necessary to pay such compensation and expenses is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Preasury not otherwise appropriated. Section 4. That any holder of the coin authorized by this act may deposit the same with the Treasurer or

any Assistant Treasurer of the United States, in sums not less than ten dollars, and receive therefor certificates of not less than ten dollars each corresponding with the denominations of United States notes. The coin deposited for or representing the certificates hall be retained in the Treasury for payment of the same on demand, and anid certificates shall be receivable for customs, taxes and all public dues, and when so received may be reissued.
