#### Notice U. S. Internal-Revenue Special Taxes.

Under the Revised Statutes of the United States, Sections 3232, 3237, 3238, and 3238, and 3139, every person engaged in any business, avocation, or employment, which renders him liable to a special tax, is required to procure and place and keep conspicuously in his establishment or place of business a STAMP denoting the payment of said special tax for the special-tax year beginning May 1, 1878.
