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LOCAL AND MISCELLANEOUS.

—Rev. Elliot will preach in the Presbyterian Church, on Sunday next, morning and evening, Sabbath School at 3 o'clock P. M.

—A little child of Cyrus Bradbury, aged about one month, died on Friday morning last.

—Samuel Adams, an old citizen of Franklin, was drowned in the Allegheny River last week.

—E. L. Davis, Esq., of Tionesta Borough is to-day announced as a candidate for Assembly, subject to Republican usages.

—Justice Shawkey, of Tionesta Borough, is to-day announced as a candidate for Prothonotary, &c., subject to Republican usages.

—The new borough officers were sworn in the first of the week. There is lots of work for the new officials to perform, and we hope they may do it in such a manner as to satisfy their constituents and earn their salaries.

—President Judge Wetmore not being present at the adjourned court held on Monday last, and some business coming up which needed his personal attention, another court was appointed for next Monday, at which he will preside.

—A newsy little paper yept The Gossip, published at Tidouite, by Mr. Walter F. Jones, has been sent us. As there is nothing said in regard to the issuing of further numbers we suppose the News will continue to occupy the whole field.

—The M. E. Mite Society was held at Mr. Darrab's last evening, and will be held in the church on next Tuesday evening, when a new arrangement of some kind will be inaugurated. The society has been a financial success so far.

—The bombarding which goes on among the hills around our town every morning (Sundays excepted) reminds one forcibly of the advance of a line of skirmishers who are meeting with a stubborn resistance. According to the number of shots fired and the amount of ammunition expended, the pigeons, "the object of the meeting," get off comparatively safe.

—The following officers of Tionesta Lodge, No. 369, I. O. O. F., were elected on Friday evening last, and will be installed on Friday evening by D. D. G. M., A. B. Kelly: N. G., J. E. Blaine; V. G., C. E. McCray.

—The subordinate officers will also be appointed and installed on next Friday evening.

—Some of our troutists have already been trying the streams. No large strings have been caught as yet, and we are inclined to believe that fishermen will have to go out into the wilderness a good ways to find good fishing this season. Last year, as for many years past, the trout streams about here have been "fished to death," to use a common expression, so that it is a good day's work to capture two or three dozen trout.

—We are under obligations to the Pennsylvania Board of Centennial Managers, for two volumes embodying the preliminary and final report of that board to the Legislature, transmitted to that body, with a message from the Governor, on the 20th ult. We are grateful for the favor, and cannot but speak highly of the board for the attention they have given the subject and the fullness of their report.

—Mr. F. L. Hall, who for something like a year past has been studying medicine with Dr. Coburn, has received and accepted an offer to go to Oregon to take charge of an extensive cheese factory for a Mr. Osborne, formerly of Crawford county. The trip will be a pleasant one and the salary is a good one for these times. "Doc" is a young man of steady habits and good character, and we hope that good fortune may accompany him in his journey to the "Far West."

—Hon. G. W. Scofield, of Warren, has been appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate to the position of Register of the Treasury, to supply the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. John Allison. There were several applicants for the position, but we believe the best selection possible has been made. Judge Scofield would honor any position within the gift of the President or people, and we are glad to see him thus honored by the present administration.

—It grieves us to learn that the price of lumber and timber at Pittsburgh, this spring is lower than it has been for some years. We have heard of no better offer for square timber than eight cents, while our lumbermen counted confidently on fourteen cents. Some have purchased it here at eight cents and run it below at a cost of perhaps two cents, and find themselves out just about what it cost to run it. The only explanation we have heard as to the low price of square timber is the small demand for barges on account of the depression in the coal trade, the numerous failures of coal men, and the consequent sale of barges at assignees' sales, at perhaps half their cost. As our square timber has heretofore been largely used in the manufacture of barges, this will, of course, account partly for the depression in prices. Our lumbermen, generally, have been to a considerable more expense than usual in putting in their lumber and timber during the past winter, on account of the scarcity of snow, and all counted confidently on getting enough more than the usual rates to pay them for the extra expense incurred. We presume that those of our lumbermen who are able to hold their lumber and timber, will do so, but there are a good many who are obliged to sell at whatever sacrifice.

LATER.—Since the above was in type one of our large lumbermen has informed us that there has been a slight advance in prices, and the prospects are that further advances will occur before long. It is to be hoped that his surmise is a correct one.

—The matter has been figured down to a fine point, and it has been found that a man can go to the Paris Exposition, stay a month, and return home, all in a respectable manner, for five hundred dollars. Now this complicates matters again. We had estimated the expense at one thousand dollars, and have economized, starved, frozen, suffered—coaxed, threatened and terrorized our patrons to get that amount scraped together, and now we are in a quandary whether to go and stay two or three months alone, or to pick up some poor editor and take him along. We find it terribly inconvenient to have more money on hands than our expenditures call for. If it wasn't that we feared our friends would shut us up in an asylum, we would be tempted to pay our debts!

—Mr. J. Q. Sweeney, who, with the aid of his school, gave a very entertaining and successful exhibition last fall, has had programmes printed at this office for "another of the same," with an entire change of performance, to come off at the Clarington Church, on Friday evening, 19th inst. Prof. Cannon, who did much to make the other exhibition a success, has been engaged for this one also, and we have no doubt that the exhibition will be well worth the price of admission, 15 and 25 cts. We hope that all the surrounding neighborhood will patronize this exhibition of home talent.

—The Wood's Heirs, of New York, who put down a well on their tract in Tionesta township last fall, have made arrangements to put down two more wells on same tract, operations to commence forthwith. The tract contains 1200 acres, and is situated between Tionesta and Little Tionesta creeks. The well drilled thereon last fall got a fair sand but no oil to speak of. The public can rest assured that this tract, at all events, will be thoroughly developed. We would feel better if all our unimproved territory were held by men who would give their personal attention to its development.

—Wm. Imbody, a farmer, who lives near Haskell's Mills, was kicked in the left eye by a horse, on Friday morning last, from the effects of which it is yet feared that he may lose the eye. Drs. Coburn and McCormick were called and found the bone on one side of the nose fractured, but the skull uninjured. He was fixed up and rendered as comfortable as circumstances would permit. We will report further of his case next week.

—Business is getting complicated over in Europe. Russia has made a treaty with Turkey which don't suit England. England, it is reported has made an alliance with Austria to enforce her demands. Russia, it is said, has, or is about to form a combination with Turkey, her late enemy, to defend her position. The press reports are contradictory, and nothing definite can be said in the premises. It looks sort of warlike over there, however.

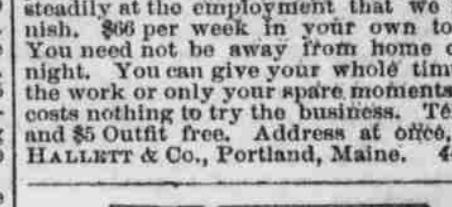

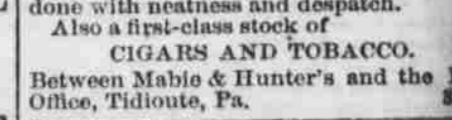
