**Republican State Convention.**  
 The Republican State Convention met at Harrisburg on Wednesday last, in response to a call from the Chairman of the Republican State Committee, to place in nomination candidates for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Judge of the Supreme Court and Secretary of Internal Affairs.  
 J. Purviance was chosen temporary Chairman of the Convention; John A. Cessna was made Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, and John Howard Reeder Chairman of the Committee on Permanent Organization.  
 Mayor Stokely, of Philadelphia was made Permanent Chairman of the Convention.  
 The following is the full text of the Resolutions:  
 The Republican party of Pennsylvania, in its historical record

and to its principles heretofore often affirmed, declares,  
 First—That it is uncompromisingly opposed to Free Trade, in whatever disguise presented; unchangingly devoted to the principles of Protection to Home Industry, and hereby avows its special and direct hostility to the Tariff bill now pending in Congress, the same being in the interests of importers and foreign manufacturers, and in opposition to American labor.  
 Second—That Labor being the great source of national wealth, the prosperity of the nation must depend upon the extent to which Labor is protected and employed, and that our Government, being a Government of the people, should endeavor to promote, by all proper means, the commercial and industrial interests of the nation, so that Labor and Capital may both be profitably employed.  
 Third—That American commerce should be fostered and home enterprise developed by the National Government, to the end that our manufacturing, mining, agricultural and industrial interests may flourish, our people find employment, and the country be restored to permanent prosperity.  
 Fourth—That the public lands belong to the people, and should be reserved exclusively for actual settlers, so that the industrious poor may be encouraged and aided to enter and occupy them.  
 Fifth—That we are now, as ever, opposed to the payment of claims from the National Treasury to those lately engaged in or sympathizing with the rebellion. No conqueror should be forced to pay indemnity to the conquered, and the presentation of bills demanding over three hundred millions of dollars, at the present session of a Democratic House, is a warning to the country of the cost and danger of retaining in power a party whose chief aim is to make reprisals on the taxpayers for losses which the crime of treason brought upon the Southern people.  
 Sixth—That we view with alarm the growing depression of many of the leading and trading interests of the State and country, resulting largely, it is believed, from unfair advantages and discriminating rates of freight and transportation privileges given by many of the transportation companies of the State and country to a favored few, to the prejudice of our general producing interests, and this Convention earnestly recommends the enactment of such laws by the State and National Legislatures as will correct this growing evil.  
 Seventh—That the Southern Republicans, white and colored, have our earnest sympathy in the unequal contest to which they are subjected for civil liberty and the maintenance of their constitutional privileges, and that in the interests of their guaranteed rights we demand from the general Government for them an equal and fair ballot, and that equality before the law which should be the boast of every government.  
 Eighth—Resolved, That the administration of Governor Hartranft meets the hearty endorsement and unqualified approval of the party that elected him and continues to honor him. He has proved himself an able magistrate, a true patriot and a wise officer; and his party tenders to him the praise due to personal uprightness, to political devotion, and to official rectitude.  
 The resolutions were unanimously adopted without debate. Those protesting against the payment of rebel claims, in favor of a protective tariff and eulogistic of Governor Hartranft's administration were loudly applauded.  
 Nominations being declared in order, Henry W. Palmer, of Luzerne, nominated for Governor General Henry M. Hoyt, eulogizing his scholarly and soldierly qualities. J. R. Wickersham, Henry Rawle, Galusha A. Grow and General James A. Beaver were also nominated.  
 General Hoyt was chosen nominee for Governor on the first ballot, receiving 161 votes; Grow 47; Beaver 12; Wickersham 29; Morrell 1. Rawle's name was withdrawn. The nomination was made unanimous amid loud applause.  
 James P. Sterrett and Daniel Agnew were nominated for Supreme Judge, and the ballot resulted—Sterrett 154 votes, Agnew 92.  
 The vote for Lieutenant Governor resulted: Charles W. Stone 182, J. Howard Jacobs 59.  
 The nominations for Secretary of Internal Affairs were Robert L. McClellan, of Chester; Aaron K. Dunkel, of Philadelphia; and John B. Donley, of Green. The last name was withdrawn before the second ballot, which resulted: Dunkel, 122; McClellan, 106, and Dunkel became the candidate.  
 General Hoyt, candidate for Governor, made an address and the convention adjourned sine die.  
 Gen. Henry M. Hoyt, of Luzerne County, our candidate for Governor, is a graduate of Lafayette and Williams Colleges, and was Colonel of the 52d Pa. Regiment during the late war retiring from the army with the rank of Brevet Brigadier General. He is

probably one of the best read men in Pennsylvania, has been prominent in politics, and his integrity is acknowledged by both parties. He is eminently qualified to fill the office of Governor of this great Commonwealth, and will bring to the office great executive ability and an intimate knowledge of the wants of the State.  
 Hon. Charles W. Stone, of Warrep, Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, is too well known in this section to need to be introduced to the people. We published his biography a couple of months ago. Suffice it to say, that in our estimation, there is no man in the State better qualified to fill the place for which he has been selected by the Republican party.  
 Hon. James P. Sterrett, of Allegheny County, the nominee of the party for Supreme Judge, was before the people last season in the same relation, and his merits were then fully discussed. His qualifications for the position are unquestioned and undoubted, and he merits the undivided support of his party.  
 Hon. Aaron K. Dunkel, of Philadelphia, candidate for the office of Secretary of Internal Affairs, was an officer in the late war and served his country faithfully. In 1874 he was elected State Senator, which position he has since filled to the entire satisfaction of his constituents. He is a man who has risen by his own efforts, and will fill the office with ability and honor.  
 Our ticket is a strong one, and with proper work by the party, can be elected by a handsome majority.

**AN ORDINANCE,**  
 PRESCRIBING THE METHOD OF BUILDING SIDEWALKS IN TIONESTA BOROUGH.  
 Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:  
 That on and after Monday, the 29th day of April, A. D. 1878, it shall be the duty of all persons owning or occupying property in Tionesta, when building new sidewalks as the same may be needed, or when required to do so by the proper borough authorities, to build all such sidewalks as hereinafter prescribed, viz:  
 All sidewalks shall be five feet three inches wide, of plain or plank, one and one-half inches thick, nailed crosswise of the walk to three oak stringers, with not less than five 20-D nails in each end every plank. Said stringers are to be two and one-half inches by five inches, set in, or halved into oak or chestnut posts, and nailed thereto by 40-D spikes; said posts to be set into the ground not less than two and one-half feet, and where the ground is wet and swampy, three feet. The posts are to be set apart five feet four inches from centre to centre of the posts. The posts to be not less than six inches in diameter. The outside stringers are to be five feet apart, measuring from the outside of each stringer.  
 Provided, however, that property owners shall be permitted to build walks of brick or flag stone, with the proper foundations, of above width.  
 All ordinances or parts, inconsistent with this, are hereby repealed.  
 Passed and approved April 29, A. D. 1878.
