C. Noble vs. P. Day and R. Swagert. Verdict for plff. and 6 cents damages. D. S. Knox vs. A. H. Partridge et al. Verdict for deft.

Derickson & Co. vs. Samuel Clark. Judgment for plffs. F. W. Ellsworth vs. W. A. Hilands et al. Judgment for plff.

Helen S. Thomas vs. Varner & Proper. Verdict for defts. The criminal cases were disposed of as follows:

Com. vs. W. E. Lathy; indictment adultery. Verdict, not guilty, but to pay half the costs, and the prosecutor, J. M. Kepler, to pay the other half.

Com. vs. Jerome Berringer; indictment, malicious shooting into Vought school house. Nol. pros. entered on defendant paying five dollars damages and costs of prosecution.

Com. vs. John Peterson; indictment selling liquor without license. Not a true bill, and prosecutor, A. T. Steen, to pay costs.

Com. vs. Martin Oakes; indictment larceny. Verdict, guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$25, restore property and undergo an imprisonment of three months in the county jail.

Hotel licenses were granted to D. S. Knox and C. E. McCray, of Tionesta, John Woodcock, of Nielsburg, and Wm. Toy, of Fagundas. An eating house license was granted to John Peterson, of Trunkerville.

Court adjourned on Saturday, to meet on third Monday in June.

Brookston Letter.

BROOKSTON, PA., May 28, 1878. ED. REPUBLICAN:—Below I write you the particulars of the death of Jas. B. Allen, better known as "Yankee" Allen, who died in Howe Township on the 25th inst., aged about 66 years.

Mr. A. had been confined to his room for about two weeks, and as there was no one present at the time of his death but his wife, some over-suspicious person or persons circulated rumors to the effect that Mrs. A. had poisoned him.

This rumor becoming common, the authorities thought best to investigate the matter, and proceeded to impanel a coroner's jury.

The following is the finding of the jury in the case: We the the undersigned, having been impaneled as a Coroner's Jury, to investigate the cause of the death of Jas. B. Allen, late of this Township, do render this, our unanimous verdict:

That the deceased came to his death from a disease of the heart,—so say we each and all of us. Given under our hands this 27th day of May, 1878, at Brookston, Forest Co., Pa.

Dr. Badger, of Sheffield, made a post-mortem examination, after which he gave the following testimony: "There was a clot in the right side of the heart, producing a stoppage of the proper circulation of the blood through the heart and lungs. I find the stomach in a healthy condition. The clot is not formed of blood alone, but is partially made up of a substance which in time would have become quite hard."

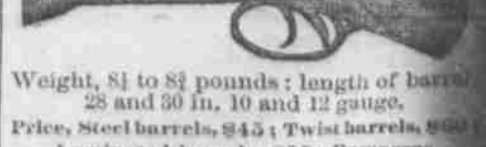
