## AN ORDINANCE,

PRESCRIBING SANITARY MEASURES FOR TIONESTA BOROUGH. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby or-dained by authority of the same: That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Town

Council to appoint, annually, a Medical Health Officer, and a Sanitary Committee consisting of three or more persons, whose duty it shall be to abate and compel the abatement of all such nuisanses as dead animals and desired abatement of all such nuisanses as dead animals, bad drains, clogged gutters, and the throwing out of slops or vegetable or animal matter in exposed places, and, at any time, when in their judgment it shall be deemed necessarry, to compel the use of such disinfectants as they may order, in privies, drains, etc. Also, to compel the isolation of all persons known to have been exposed to small-nox, and empowerbeen exposed to small-pox, and empowering the Committee and Health Officer to provide suitable place for, and proper care of persons afflicted with this disease. Also o compel the vaccination of all children attending public schools,

Any person neglecting or refusing to comply with the requirements of the said Health Officer and Sanitary Committee acting in accordance with this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than fifty dollars, or imprisonment not exceed-ing sixty days, or both, at the discretion of the Health Officer and Sanitary Com-
