OUR TICKET.

The ticket nominated on Saturday, which appears in its appropriate place to-day, is one of which the party can be justly proud. There is not a man on it but merits, and will probably receive the solid Republican vote of the county. All are straight Republicans and reliable men. All that remains for the Republicans of Forest county to do, is to accept cheerfully the result, and work and vote for the nominees with as good faith as if each had been their particular choice at the Primaries. Our system is gotten up with a view to ascertain who is the choice of a majority of the party for each office, and in taking part in the nominations each voter, by that act, signifies his intention to abide the result and support those men who may be the choice of the majority. We state this, because we have heard, in times past, different views expressed on the subject. We believe there were just as good men defeated as were nominated, yet, it was not the will of the party that they should be their candidates, and we bow to their decision, and can as cheerfully work and vote for the nominees as if we had voted for each of them at the Primaries. AN ORDINANCE, PRESCRIBING SANITARY MEASURES FOR TIONESTA BOROUGH. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same: That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Town Council to appoint, annually, a Medical Health Officer, and a Sanitary Committee consisting of three or more persons, whose duty it shall be to abate and compel the abatement of all such nuisances as dead animals, bad drains, dogged gutters, and the throwing out of slops or vegetable or animal matter in exposed places, and, at any time, when in their judgment it shall be deemed necessary, to compel the use of such disinfectants as they may order, in privies, drains, etc. Also, to compel the isolation of all persons known to have been exposed to small-pox, and empowering the Committee and Health Officer to provide suitable place for, and proper care of persons afflicted with this disease. Also to compel the vaccination of all children attending public schools. Any person neglecting or refusing to comply with the requirements of the said Health Officer and Sanitary Committee acting in accordance with this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of not more than fifty dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding sixty days, or both, at the discretion of the Health Officer and Sanitary Committee.
