To-day, the paper currency of the country aggregates os 1865 were due to the \$300,000,000 additional currency, or that the contraction of that amount has produced the present hard times ? It is safe to estimate the shrinkage in values since 1865 at not less than two thirds. Take all the property of the country, real and personal, and it was worth not less than three times its present value. The Greenback orators put it even higher than this, but we have been careful to speak within bounds. Now if times were flush, money plenty, and in abundance to do the business of the country, when we had only \$983,000,-000, is it consistent with facts to say that seven-tenths of that amount is insufficient to do the business of the country when values have shrunk to

one third the standard of 1865? And vet the Greenback newspapers are howling for more currency as the only antidote to the financial sufferings of the country.

the country. "The truth is, we have enough mon-ey. It is industry and economy, and personal honesty which need increas-ing; it is business integrity, and a de-termination on the part of all classes to buy only what can be paid for, and to put in a full day's work for a full day's pay. If a million of our farmers and mechanics were put into the army and mechanics were put into the army and the Government forced to buy the guns, and ammunition, and horses, and clothing, and rations, and the thousand other things required by men engaged in butchering each other, good times for those at home would soon come again, high prices for labor and produce would rule again, and money would be plenty, even if the aggregate be a Greenbacker.
