That Ex-Tressurers Mackey and Rawle have filed bonds for the collection of the small items of losses sustained under their respective administrations of the affairs of the Treasury, as soon as the amount which cannot be collected from the bank in which the money was deposited can be ascertained. Fourth. Both Wm. H. Kemble and Eli Slifer are good for the losses which occurred in their administration, in case the State fails to collect from the banks in question.
