Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 20, '78. There are too many despondent Republicans in the country—too many a matter of policy, and too many if we look at the only reason we have for discouragement. The Democratic party, buried for twenty years under

overwhelming defeat, never showed more signs of weakness than some Republican leaders are now doing. There are men connected with the Republican Congressional Committee here, and who have had much to do with the management of affairs, who might with profit be retired to private life, unless they can keep their heads better than now seems possible. Earnest Republicans everywhere are complaining of these men. Representative Hale, Chairman of the Committee, should come here and assume charge.

The Hon. Wm. E. Chandler is a prophet of disaster in his own State, also. Of the feelings entertained by the President for Mr. Chandler, or by Mr. Chandler for the President, this is not the place to speak, nor is this the time for Mr. Chandler or any other Republican to make personal grievances a distracting element in the campaign. It will be much more satisfactory to all of us, or ought to be, if we can settle whatever quarrels we have after victory instead of after defeat.

The social world bids fair to present a gay scene at the National Capitol the coming season, though many changes will take place in fashionable society because of the expiration of the terms of so many Congressmen. The families of the Cabinet Ministers will take a more conspicuous part in society than they did last winter, owing to various well known circumstances.

There was characteristic difference between the Massachusetts Republican Convention yesterday and the Democratic Convention just before. Men of sense and intelligence in Massachusetts and elsewhere will not fail to consider the facts. A wild mob embracing a majority of the delegates to the Democratic State Convention, assembled and nominated for Governor a moral, social and political outlaw,—a man who had been kicked out of every Republican Convention in Massachusetts for years. They did it in the midst of riot and blasphemy. The exact opposite of all this was the work of yesterday, and we have a candidate every Republican may be proud of. If we do not throw our full vote when the contest is between Talbot and Butler we shall deserve defeat. But we shall do it. A canvass like Butler's can but grow weaker as election time draws nigh.

Hon. Matt H. Carpenter has made a great many friends in Washington and has here a large law practice. As a lawyer he stood high in the Senate. The Republicans of Wisconsin are fortunate in having so many men of commanding ability to select from in choosing a United States Senator, but the contest seems to be chiefly between Messrs. Howe and Carpenter. Either of them will honor the great and growing State.

Besides freely contributing money the people of the North, who have abundant harvests, should remember that trade and industry are temporarily destroyed in a large section, and that even after the fever has subsided there will be great distress from the lack of food.
