Important to Voters.

The next election held in Pennsylvania will be held on Tuesday, the 4th of November.

Voters must be assessed two months preceding the election, that is, on or before Thursday, September 4th.

Voters must have paid a State or County tax one month preceding the election, that is, on or before Saturday, October 4th.

Members of the County Committee should see to it that every voter of our party has complied with the law.

Failure to pay tax in season deprives the voter of the privilege of suffrage. An elector can swear in his vote, though he be not assessed, but the neglect may cause him much trouble.

SOME of the Democratic organs are forgetting themselves in the vigor with which they denounce the riot damages bill, and the attempts to pass it by lobby influences. Was not Mr. Daniel O. Barr, the present candidate of the Democrats for State Treasurer, a member of that same lobby?

THE Greenbackers of Washington county are a different kind of Greenbackers from those of the rest of the State. They have adopted a series of resolutions in which they announce themselves the Union Greenback party, dropping the word National. The effect of this is to cut themselves loose from the State organization, and make them a portion of Brick Pomeroy's little crowd, which is not recognized as regular by the chairman of the Pennsylvania State committee.

THE Philadelphia Record is entitled to credit for fairness at least, and is not afraid to speak out in meeting, and tell its Democratic friends what the matter is. It says of the present policy of the managers of that party:

The blunders who have of late been looking after the interests of the Democratic party in Ohio and some of the other States must regard with dismay the improved business outlook in all parts of the country. There was much practical good sense in the advice which General Grant once gave to the Republican managers, which was to do nothing beyond waiting for the customary Democratic blunders. Here are the Democrats of Ohio relying upon the despondency which is born of desolation as the well spring of their utmost hopes, while the press of the country is burdened with reports of business activity.

Our Washington Letter.

SPECIAL TO THE REPUBLICAN. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28, '79.

There is a revolution coming in Northern politics. There are men not Republicans who now realize the folly of the South in repelling all advances made by the North towards the establishment of kindly feeling between the two sections, and so acting as to prevent mutual good will for years. It is a fact that the Southern people have repelled a tide of emigration from the North that would have given that section abundant capital for the development of its almost unlimited natural resources and would have supplied them with an abundance of better labor than they have ever known, and which capital and labor would not only have developed their agricultural resources, but would have established manufactories, opened their minds, built railroads, covered their broad rivers with the white wings of commerce, and done all those things necessary to make that section rich and independent, as the Southern people themselves cannot make it.

Instead of welcoming such emigration they have repelled it by persecutions, extending in many cases to arson and murder, and have by armed organizations, prevented the exercise of any political rights except such as could be exercised within the organization of the Democratic party. This, I say, is bringing about a political revolution in the North. We hear of it every day from Maise, from Ohio, and from every other State whose coming election has begun to attract attention. The North will be as "solid" this Fall for individual rights as the South is for their suppression.

Democrats in Ohio now concede the election of Foster, and are making a desperate effort to carry the Legislature so as to re-elect Thurman to the Senate. The arrangement of the Senatorial and Representative districts is such that they might accomplish this with a majority of 25,000 against them in the State. But, Foster's majority will exceed those figures and the Republicans are too active and vigilant to be beaten in the Legislature by any sort of combination.

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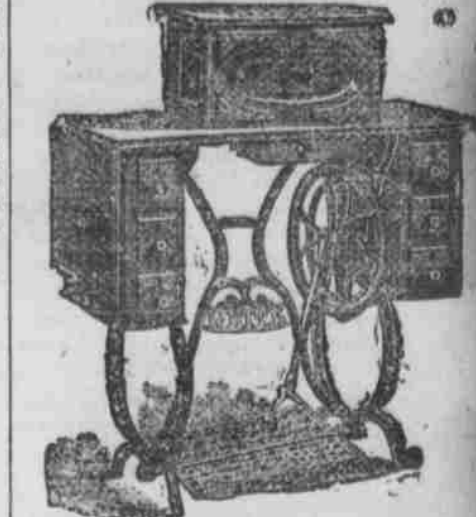

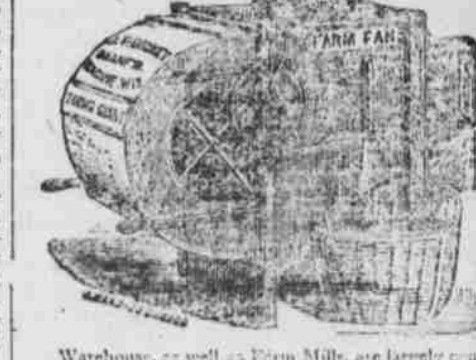
