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ATTEMPTED BANK ROBBERY. A Daring Attempt to Burglarize May, Park & Co.'s Bank.

Yesterday morning at the usual hour, as Mr. Kelly entered the Bank and walked into the room where the safe stands he was astonished to find the outside door broken open and a lot of implements scattered about promiscuously on the floor.

An attempt was evidently made to go through the second doors by outside force, as one of the handles was broken off, but being unable to work to as good advantage on them they apparently abandoned it.

Up to this writing Mr. Kelly has been unable to open the doors, and cannot tell what damage has been done on the inside.

The burglars were not entire strangers, it would seem, as they knew where to get tools to work with.
