The unit rule was adopted the same as in this State. A few more delegations like these and Grant's chances for nomination may be set down as very good.

DENNIS KEARNEY has conceived the idea that there is a conspiracy on foot in San Francisco for his assassination, and in a speech at a Hoodlum meeting the other night he stated that he would leave in the hands of certain parties a list of names of persons who were to be guillotined by the workmen in the event of his (Kearney's) assassination. It must be true that Kearney's power is waning or he would not be compelled to resort to such petty trickery to keep himself in place at the head of the Workingmen's party.

From D. H.'s "Recollections of Fifty Years," published in the Venango Speculator, we call the following in regard to this county:

The most of the land in Forest county is heavily timbered with beech, sugar maple, hemlock, ash and cherry. South of Bucks Mills and Panther Rock are many nice situations for manufacturing maple sugar. Salmon creek and the Branch are both excellent water powers. The stream called the Branch heads about three miles south of Balltown, runs a west course, about parallel with Tionesta creek, and empties into Salmon creek, about a mile from its mouth.

There are more deer at the present time along the Branch than on any other stream in Forest county. I have hunted there some, but never had any run over me yet. They were always going the other way.

Salmon creek heads near Marien, the old county seat, or Blood's Settlement, as it was originally called. It runs a northwest course and empties into Tionesta two and a half miles above Newtown Mills. I was once hunting at the head of the Branch with two companions. I went east from the camp by myself and soon got on a bear track. I followed till I came to the site of an improvement. It was where William Patterson lived. As it was raining and I was wet, I staid there all night. Mr. Patterson was an old soldier of the war of 1812, and had fought at the battle of Baltimore. I had one of Colt's navy revolvers with me, and showed it to the old man. It was the first revolver he had ever seen. I explained its working to him, and as an offset he showed me a butcher knife, which he said was made to drive the British out of Baltimore. He was then a very old man—over ninety—and age had begun to tell on him. He lived in that lone spot, a considerable distance from any neighbor. He died last fall.
