"STATE CAPITALISMS."

HARRISBURG, PA., March 20, '80. The Board of Pardons met on Tuesday last, and after hearing over fifty cases and granting less than a half dozen pardons, adjourned until the 27th inst., when they will reconvene to act on the cases of the Bribery Convicts.

Two of the watchmen on the "hill" were today arrested for stealing state reports, &c., and selling them for old paper. For some time past it has been impossible to obtain Agricultural reports, and as there were a large number printed and very few sent away it occurred to an employee of one of the departments to "look the thing up." The State Library had been robbed of a large number of these reports, together with a lot of postage stamps and postal cards, and the Librarian had placed the matter into the hands of a detective, who, together with the employee before mentioned, traced five bags of the reports to a junk dealer who had bought them for old paper, at the rate of two cents a pound, books that had cost the state three dollars apiece. Several thousand were also found in a neighboring paper mill. The case is in the hands of the District Attorney, who expects to make further developments and send the thieves where they belong.

We've had more snow and rain this week, which, consequently, has not improved the condition of the streets. Last Thursday some boys made a miniature ship about five feet long, fully equipped with sails, and placed it in the middle of Third Street. On its side it bore the following: "Councilmen's excursion through Venice." You can imagine the depth of mud and water when I tell you that application has been made for a charter for a ferry company to navigate the two principal streets. And this is our State Capital.

This filthy little town that aspires to be called a city. It's not only a disgrace to itself but also a shame to the State.

Nebraska Letter.

NORTH PLATTE, LINCOLN CO., NEB. } March 20, '80. } ED. REPUBLICAN:

Thinking Tionesta might lose sight of me should I keep silent I concluded to let you know at least where I was, how I came, and what the surroundings are here:

In company with Mr. Thos. Soodgrass, of President, and several others from Pennsylvania. We left Oil City for North Platte, Neb., on March 8. When we arrived at Omaha the weather was quite cold, 6° below zero, and several inches of snow; beyond the Missouri river, when we came to the North Platte river the weather was pleasant, and we could see thousands of wild geese flying, farmers plowing, sowing wheat, and some even husking corn. Arrived at North Platte on March 11, at 2 a. m., in the morning. The air was dry, roads were very nice, and a team at the depot took us six miles out in the country. But then in a day or so we had quite a snow storm.

North Platte is a thriving town of 2000 inhabitants, situated at the junction of the North and South Platte rivers. The land in this section is more particularly adapted to stock raising than farming, and this forms the principal business of the inhabitants of the town. The game here is principally deer, elk, buffalo, antelope, and various other small game, such as wolves, wildcats, jack-rabbits, prairie chickens, grouse, &c. There is considerable government land to be taken up near this town yet, but settlers are fast coming in.

I am going over into Kansas in a few weeks, and perhaps will write again if I see anything new.
