It contains the proceedings of Congress of that early date, which are very different from those we now read in the papers. The next is The Western Egin and Public Advertiser, dated June 24, 1824, and published in Georgetown, Brown county, Ohio. It is also a curiosity. The third is published at Warren, Pa., by Parker C. Purviance, March 18, 1830, and called the Warren Gazette. This was in the days of Anti Masonry, and the paper is chuck full of it. It contains many curious advertisements, among which are the names of Abram Hazeline, L. Wetmore and T. Stuthers. These are still familiar to the citizens of that ancient burg. The news contained in this paper is of a general character, and there are but one or two local items in it. Here is one:

"Singular Anomaly.—An ewe belonging to Mr. Martin, of this borough, a few days since gave birth to a lamb, with two heads, two tails, four ears, and six legs. It was born alive, but survived but a short time. We understand it is now in the hands of a person who will stuff and preserve it."

The papers are quite well preserved, and are valuable relics.
