The Niagara Excursion.

The Republican Convention of Forest county met at the Court House, in Tionesta, yesterday at 2 o'clock, and was called to order by Chairman Davis, who after a few appropriate remarks, withdraw and left the Return Judges to effect a perminent organization. This was done by the election of Mr. B. D. McClure, of Howe twp., as President, and Mr. P. M. Clark, of Tionesta boro., Secretary.

The first business in order was the canvassing of the vote, which was done, the precincts being called in alphabetical order. After the votes were counted, the Secretary announced the result, and the following gentlemen were declared the regular nominees of the Republican party of Forest county, by the President of the con-
