Washington, November 4,-There is considerable speculation here as to part of the work. the composition of Garfield's cabinet, and it is authoritatively stated that it will be cast as follows: John Sherman will remain in the Treasury in spite of his alleged determination to withdraw; Senator Conkling, Secretary of State; Senator Logan, Secretary of War; Secretary Schurz, will remain in charge of the Interior Department; Hon, Ben Harrison, of Indiana, will he Postmaster-General; and Colonel THE BUCKEYE BLACKSMITH, Robert G. 
