FOLLOWING is a copy of House Bill No. 84, known as "Fling's General Liceuse Bill." The bill has made some progress in the Legislature, and its chances for passage or defeat are about equal :

SECTION 1 .- Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania teresting to the people of your county. in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That licenses for the sale of liquors shall be uniform in the several counties of this commonwealth and shall be classified, fixed and ascertained as follows: Where the mercantile appraiser shall estimate the yearly sale at ten thousand dollars or more he shall appraise the vendor as of the first-class and such vendor shall pay the sum of seven hundred dollars, where the estimated yearly sales shall be eight thousand dollars and not more than ten thousand dollars such vendor shall be of the second class and pay not more than four hundred dollars; where the estimated yearly sales shall be six thousand dollars and not more than eight thousand dollars such vendor shall be of the third class, and shall pay not more than two hundred dollars; where the estimated yearly sales shall be four thousand dollars and not more than six thousand dollars, the fourth class, and shall pay

t more than one hundfed dollars where the estimated yearly sales shall be not more than four thousand dollarl the fifth class, and shall pay fifty dollars. Provided, That any vendor of liquors may be liceused for any part of the year on his or her paying the proportionate charge for such portion of a year. And provided further, That no license for a part of a year be issued for less than twenty-five dollars. Sectron 2.-That the sums realized

#### THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10, '81. The adoption of the program agreed pon in the Democratic caucus by the two Houses, robbed the final formality of the electoral count yesterday of the little interest of a dramatic kind that promised to attach to it in the early days of the session. This back-down from the position early assumed by the majority, of a count under the Morgan joint rule or no count at all, while it ceremony, detracted largely from its interest, and stripped it of many of its attractions. Nevertheless the event of the formal declaration , that James A. Garfield is President, and Chester A. Arthur is Vice President for the term of four years from the 4th of March 1881, had in itself interest enough to attract thousands of people to the Capital, more than could be squeezed into the Chamber of the House. There never has been an electoral count which proceeded so quietly or consumed less time in ascertaining and declaring the result than the one of yesterday. The only incident worthy of mention was the hasty retirement of Alex. H. Stephens from the Hall, upon the refusal of the joint convention (in conformity to the concurrent resolution) to actually count the vote of the State of Georgia.

After the adjournment of the joint convention, the House took up and passed the legislative appropriation bill, which leaves but two more to be acted upon by that body.

The Senate upon the return to the Senate Chamber continued the discussion of the Pension appropriation bill. The amendment known as the "Sixty Surgeon" bill, gotten up and championed by Commissioner Bently, was defeated by decided majority. The bill then without material change, passed. The Post Office bill was then taken up and will pass to-day.
