Be Just to the Legislature.

The letter in yesterday's Press protesting against the indiscriminate censure of the Legislature was in many respects just and timely. The newspapers have become so accustomed to abusing the Legislature that this fault-finding has with many of them become chronic.

We note a general tendency to speak of the present Legislature in the same tone of disparagement to which we had become accustomed in the case of its predecessors. The charges against it are not specific. We hear of no boom bills, no organized raid upon the Treasury, and no creation of offices with extraordinary emoluments for the benefit of favorite politicians.

When we deduct from the total length of the present session the days consumed in the protracted Senatorial struggle the time left for real legislative work has been very short. We are not of those who think that the time given to the Senatorial contest was wasted or that it was barren of substantial and valuable results.

In the matter of the nomination of Judge Robertson to be director of the port of New York, and over which Senator Conkling is preparing to make resistance in the Senate. The understanding to-day is that, the President has no intention of withdrawing the nomination, and the New York Senators have no intention of yielding and allowing the nomination to be confirmed.

The merits of a Legislator is not to be measured by the number of laws

which it may pass. If that were the case the bulky volumes of our pamphlet laws would compel us to give the highest praise to some Legislatures who have deserved and received the severest reprobation. The work of a Legislature includes defeating bills as well as passing them. To prevent abuses is no less meritorious than to correct them, though labor thus employed may entirely escape the public eye and be omitted in the estimate of the work done.

While it is true that the present Legislature has seemed more or less disorganized and has proceeded hitherto in a somewhat aimless and haphazard fashion, these are evils which time and experience would cure. There is an unusually large proportion of new members who compel all Legislative business to drag while they are learning it. Bills can no longer be railroaded through the Legislature as in the olden time. The dilatory course which all bills are now compelled to take before they can become laws is in accordance with the will of the people, expressed in the new Constitution.

THE NATIONAL CAPITOL.

SPECIAL TO THE REPUBLICAN. WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 31, '81.

There are a number of conflicting rumors afloat to-day touching the attitude of Attorney General McVeagh towards the nomination of Wm. E. Chandler to be Solicitor General. One was that at Chandler's own request the nomination was to be withdrawn. Another was that Chandler protested against withdrawing his name until the Senate had disposed of the nomination. It appears that Mr. Chandler was promised the Solicitor Generalship before Mr. McVeagh's name was decided upon as Attorney General, and hence his friends say that was not intended as an offense to the Attorney General, as has been stated in some quarters.

The Democrats still continue the filibustering began over a week ago to prevent the Republicans from electing the Senate officers and as is usual they are receiving a sound drubbing from the Republicans.

It is highly desirable should become laws. But if the Legislature should do nothing else than pass the Appropriation Bills and relieve Philadelphia of the two superfluous offices she is seeking to get rid of, it will leave behind it a record of which its members will have no reason to be ashamed.
