That they propose hereafter to pay to American authors for acceptable manuscripts a copyright of 15 per cent. instead of 10 per cent. and they claim that their low prices, and immense sales resulting therefrom, are far more in the interest of authors than much larger copyright on the commonly limited number of sales-"One thousand books, profit \$1.00 each-\$1,000. One million books, profit one cent each-\$1,000."
