Colorado Camping.

IS CAMP, NORTH PARK, COLO., September 15, 1881.

ED. REPUBLICAN:-It being too cold to work in the field, and feeling lonesome for something to do I will write you a

"stickfull" or two. We have succeeded in getting down from the summit at Muddy Pass and out through the canons of Grizzly Creek, and are now in a fine open plain known as North Park. We have crossed the Continental Divide and the "Backbone" of America is far off to the west of us probably twenty miles, while the Park Range is east of us about one hundred miles, although plainly visible with the naked eve. even unto the stratification of rock contained in their almost perpendicular sides -so pure and rare is the atmosphere. We are at an elevation of 8009 feet above the ocean level at our present encampment. Last night the mereury registered 5° below -nothing-and to-day it stood at 19° in in Sept. ? It freezes every night in the year. No timber to speak of except a few straggling patches of our common eastern aspen and Rocky Mountain spruce-a species of pine midway between our white pine and hem lock. There are no minerals to speak of in this immediate vicinity; this being a volcanic region we find scarcely anything but "brimstone" or mud lava and other igenous rocks. We have some splendid specimens, however,

of small fragments of pellucid quartz and

other forms of stratified and pumary

The water is not good in this section at all. It is highly impregnated with alkali; so much so that after washing ones hands in the water and allow it to dry an incrustation of alkali is visible on the smoother parts of the hands; this is creek water, I mean. In the east we read of the splendid water in the Rocky Mountains. I would sooner have one good old Forest county sand stone spring than a dozen "Rocky" springs. In the plains the water is all copper and arsenies of lead before reaching the surface. The same hubbub is also rife about the mines. I traveled over 150 miles through the best mining region of Colorado, and as our wagon train was very slow I had ample opportunity to inspect the best mines and still keep up with our wagons. 

Certificates of such swearing or affirming shall be duly made out and signed by the officers so sworn, and attested by the officer who administered the cath. If any judge or minority inspector refuses or fails to swear the officers of tor refuses or fails to swear the officers of election in the manner required by this act, or if any officer of election shall not without being duly sworn, or if any officer of election shall certify that any officer was sworn when he was not, it shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the officer or officers so offending shall be ined not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

ARTICLE VIII.

SUPPRAGE AND ELECTION.

SEC. I. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be cutified to vote at all elections:

First.-He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.
Second.-tre shall have resided in the State one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed thereform and returned, then six moths,) immediate

ately preceding the election.

Third,—He shall have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid a State or county tax which shall have been assessed

at least (we months and paid at least one mouth before election.

SEC. 2. The General election shall be held annually on the Tuesday next follow-

ing the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the mem-

bers of each House consenting thereto,

Sec. 11. It shall be lawful for any qualified citizen of the district, notwithstanding the name of the proposed voter is contained on the list of resident taxables, to challenge the vote of such person, whereupon the proof of the right of suffrage as is now required by haw shall be publicly made and acted upon by the election board and the vote admitted or rejected, according to the evidence. Every person claiming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization certificate at the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person be-ing received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word "voted," with the day, month and year; and if any election offi-cer or officers shall receive a second vote on the same day, by virtue of same cer-thicate, except where sons are cutilled to vote because of the naturalization of their lathers, they and the person who shall offer such second vote, shall be gullry of a meaner, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year The like numbhment shall be inflicted. n conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement required more said naturalization
