The fall and winter climate in this country is delicious. You can imagine nothing finer; Air has rained; no dust, and everything just perfect. The nights are always cool. In the heat of summer two thick quilts are not uncomfortable. Ranchers here, when they hire a man, expect to board him but never furnish him a sleeping place. He has his roll of blankets and can spread them down wherever he can find a good place, One man told me his experience. He had just come from Buffalo; had never learned the habits here. He hired out was a ranch of six thousand acres, and all the buildings on it would not cover as much space as Robinson stere -house, barns and everything. They sat in the cabin after supper and finally the new man said he would like to be showed to his room. The rancher said: "H-I, there's six thousand acres of land here, and room on it anywhere for you. Pick out the best spot you can find." Of course

One of the most striking features of this valley are the Butte Mountains, which rise abruptly from the plains. They are about twenty miles long, three miles wide, and the two peaks are some 1500 feet high.
