A friend tells me this, which illustrates one phase of California life: He was agent for a machinery firm of San Francisco. His employers sent him to a certain man to sell him threashers. He found the man with seven children, wife, dogs, etc., living in a house with one room below and one above. No barns on the ranch, nothing that evidenced comfort or prosperity. He sold the man two threshing machines and three 15 horse power engines to un on his own place, and received his coin, some \$5,000. Such people are found mostly in the southern part of the State. The people of this, the northern part are very similar, except that they are not homogenous, to the people of the east. There are few hamlets, and it seems to me, no neighborhoods in this country. The country about here is one of the

garden spots of the earth. It is adapted to almost any kind of husbandry. Wheat is produced as the main crop. It yields from thirty to sixty bushels per acre. Grapes grow luxuriously and yield in quantities that astonish an Eastern man. The vines produce two crops each year, the second being inferior in quality and quantity. Both wine and raisin grapes can be raised well. Raisin grapes pay best, one man of my acquaintance having cleared \$10,000 in one year from about forty acres of muscatelles. Fruit, such as apricots, figs and prunes, pay very largely on the investment, from \$100 to \$500 per acre. The land down instead of up.
