They are now engaged in taking risks on children, the parents paying a small sum per week to insure their little ones against death from scarlet fever, diphtheria and kindred diseases. The insurance is done in classes, and is part of a systematic scheme by which poor men and women are swindled out of their hard earnings. It is only a question of time as to the collapse of the new scheme as did the mutual speculative business."

—Who says Forest county is not taking its place rapidly among the farming counties of the State? Listen to this: Last week Judge Proper shipped from his Dutch Hill farm, the first car load of wheat that ever left the county. It contained 537 bushels, and brought \$1.37 1/2 per bushel. The land from which this crop was raised yielded an average of 26 bushels to the acre; it cost \$14 per acre to clear and grub it, so that there was not a stump or sprout left on the ground. It will thus be seen that the Judge more than got his money back the first year. He also shipped at the same time nine head of cattle, raised on the farm. Who will now dispute that farming pays in Forest County?

Tionesta & Allegheny River R. R.

At a meeting held in Oil City, on Thursday evening last, by the President and directors of the T. & A. R. R. Co., at their general office, Mr. A. B. Kelly, Cashier of May, Park & Co., Bankers, of our place, was elected Treasurer. Resolutions were passed to open books for subscription to the stock at Oil City, New York, and at May, Park & Co.'s bank in our town. This looks like business. While we cannot say the road is a certainty, we believe that if our citizens will take the proper interest the road will be built. Most of the parties working this enterprise are experienced railroad men, and assure us that capitalists East are ready and willing to invest, provided those who will be the most benefited by the road—that is, the owners of the timber lands along Tionesta creek—will do their share. We earnestly hope each and every citizen of the county will assist in the enterprise.

A railroad up Tionesta creek would undoubtedly be the means of bringing in factories for making all kinds of wooden implements and articles, as no better locality could be found in the country, where all kinds of wood can be had, and in abundance. Regarding the new road, the following article from the Philadelphia Ledger, of February 23, will be of interest to our readers:

"The Tionesta and Allegheny River Railroad, standard gauge, is to be built early this coming spring. This road is one of the remarkably easy grades, not exceeding ten feet to the mile, and starts from Sheffield, on the Philadelphia and Erie Railroad, running along the Tionesta Creek to its mouth, and thence down the Allegheny river on the east bank to Oil City, a total distance of 58 miles, and will be an important link to Pennsylvania Railroad interests, as it will give that company a new route for their Allegheny Valley and low grade road coals to Buffalo and Canada as far as Warren, instead of only to Oil City, as now. The new road passes through the newly developed oil territory of the lower portion of Warren county, as well as the interior of Forest county, the entire distance along the Tionesta Creek, a section well known

for oil and its dense valuable timber lands. A large portion of the saw oil fields are owned by the Forest Oil Company and the Enterprise Transit Company, the latter a Philadelphia and Pittsburgh interest."
