SOME changes have taken place in the Cabinet during the week. Senator Teller of Colorado, succeeds Mr. Kirkwood as Secretary of the Interior; Wm. E. Chandler succeeds Mr. Hunt as Secretary of the Navy, the latter being as Minister to Russia. John Russell Young will be Minister to China.

REV. F. S. HEATH, editor and free-souled proprietor of the Corry Wheelback Labor Reform Herald, and leading candidate for any office which may be tendered him, has at last climbed to the top of the Greenback ladder and is now Chairman of the State Committee, he having been elected to the exalted position last week at a meeting of the Committee at Harrisburg.—Milwaukee Herald.

The veto of the Chinese bill, has reduced no little surprises, but this surprise is not more on account of the fact that the President has vetoed an act which passed by such overwhelming majorities, than on account of the fact that there existed such overwhelming reasons for vetoing it. The country certainly requires a restriction Chinese immigration, but it does not require that we dishonor ourselves by repudiation of a treaty remodeled suit our own wishes less than two years ago. It is now the proper thing for Congress to remodel the act, and like it in conformity with our treaty obligations. The industries of the country must be looked to, as likewise national honor. The action of Congress should be in harmony with the wisdom of the country. There is wisdom enough in our house to suggest the way, if the members will pay more attention to the effect of their action on the interest of the country and less attention to effect on the next election.—Mead's Republican.
