At a caucus of the Republican members of the House, held at Harrisburg a few days ago, Mr. Hulings of Venango offered a resolution that a committee of 10 be appointed, whose duty it shall be to prepare a legislative apportionment bill to be offered to the House as a substitute for the Democratic House bill and report the same to the caucus. After a short debate, the resolution was adopted. The chair appointed as the committee Messrs. Hulings, Vodges, Morrison Allegheny, Niles, Stees, Colborne, Thompson (Dauphin), Potts, Landis, etouche and the Chairman. At the same caucus it was suggested by Mr. Davis of Forest that it would be a good idea to have a committee of five appointed to take charge of the interests of the House, as up to the present time everything had been in a go-as-you-please condition. The caucus adopted the suggestion, and appointed as the committee Messrs. Davis of Forest, Niles of Tioga, Colborne of Somerset, Hulings of Venango, and Brown of Erie.—Franklin Press.

PROHIBITION.

Harrisburg advises state that the House committee on Constitutional reform have agreed to report the prohibition amendment bill favorably with an amendment, by Mr. Furth, of Philadelphia, as follows:

Provided, That compensation shall be made out of the Treasury of the Commonwealth to all persons who own real estate which has been occupied, ceased and the license paid for the manufacture or sale of the articles be named, for five successive years previous to the adoption of the amendment, which will be reduced in value by reason of the destruction of their business by its adoption, and the Legislature shall after its adoption provide the manner in which the said injury or reduction in value shall be ascertained and paid.

The democrats at Harrisburg are said to come out boldly against submitting a prohibitory amendment to a people and propose to defeat it by voting to it a job which would rob the State treasury for years to come.

They ought to make one more amendment, providing that a two-gallon measure of whisky shall be provided for every democrat in the Commonwealth and replenished from time to time as shall be necessary, the same to be paid for out of any funds that shall be in the State Treasury. With these amendments constitutional prohibition would have no terrors for the democratic party. This state of affairs must be consoling to the prohibitionists who are persisted in working against the party which has ever shown a willingness to give prohibition a fair trial, and enforce it if a majority of the people want it. No prohibition amendment has ever been submitted to a vote of the people in a democratic State, nor ever will be. No temperance man or woman in Pennsylvania for a moment believes that a republican party, had it a majority in the State Legislature, would not be willing to submit a constitutional prohibition amendment to the people, and yet they continue to work for moderate success by throwing their votes away on candidates of their own amendment with such a provision that proposed could only meet with overwhelming defeat, and that defeat would throw the temperance cause back years in the matter of a constitutional amendment. But the course the temperance people would seem to indicate that this is just what they are. It is most assuredly what is intended by the Perry and Gray style prohibition cranks.—Meadville Republican.

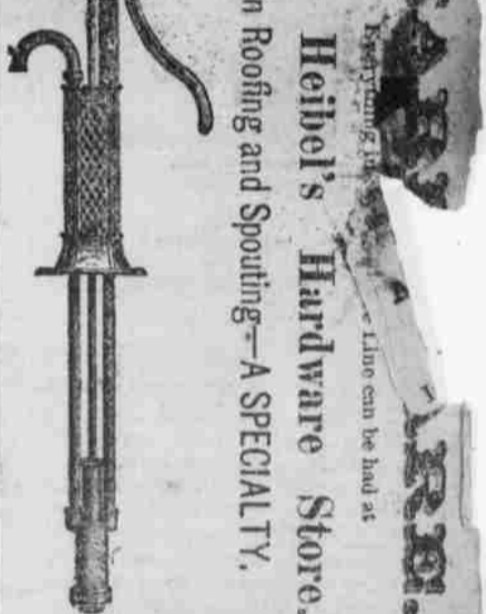
