A "MILENT SUPPER" is the name of a novel entertainment to be given by a Williamsport Sunday school. Those who can eat their supper without snubbing will be entertained free of charge. Those who talk will be charged 25 cents, and those who talk and snub will be taxed 30 cents.

The cotton crop this year will reach 800,000 bales. This means prosperity for the South. The European goods will send up the price of Northern grain, and that means prosperity for the North. A CHANGE in the game law is deemed very necessary in regard to killing deer. The season now extends from October 1 to December 31, and should be from Sept. 1 to Dec. 1. Such a change would prevent in some measure extermination of deer in Northern Pennsylvania. Last season 300 deer were killed in the month of December than in the two preceding months. The cold weather does not set in until the first of December here hunting parties camp out and kill the deer by the dozen. In mild weather hunters cannot do such wholesale slaughter.

The above extract from the Warren all sets forth the ideas of nine-tenths the hunters and citizens of this county. If another slaughter of deer this county like that of the past season should be perpetrated, there will be no need of a law to protect the noble game five years hence, as it will surely have become extinct. Will our legislators take heed in time?

The present terrific floods in the North American rivers should serve as a very emphatic moral. The vastness of forests has much to do with these mighty torrents which sweep irresistibly everything before them that can be floated. Pennsylvania is losing her once famous forests in two principal causes—the greed of the lumberman and tanner and the timber forest fire. It is time our legislators adopt the most stringent legal measures to preserve as far as possible the forests still remaining. New York is waking up at last to this important subject and is now proposing to make a public park of the Adirondack region and put a stop to the lumbering process which has so long prevailed in that region. While such a plan is not feasible in this State, much may yet be done to prevent the irreparable denudation of our forest resources in the central and northwestern part of the State, which furnish the trees of the Susquehanna and Allegheny rivers. Whatever can be done in this direction should have prompt attention.—Phila. Times.

The idea of the Times may perhaps be a correct one, but just how the legislature is going to pass a law prohibiting persons from taking the timber on their own lands is something that needs a little explanation.

A LITERARY society in the northeastern corner of Erie county, Pa., has resolved to go out of business entirely.
