OIL NOTES.

Balltown seems to be attracting the bulk of attention now-a-days among oil men. The Welsh well was opened Monday, and although not as large as expected is still a fair sized producer, it having opened up at the rate of 1000 barrels a day.

Yesterday's Derrick furnished the following news from the Cooper district: "Anchor Oil Company's No. 9 struck the third sand yesterday. It made four flows between 2 o'clock in the morning and 7 a. m.

The Tionesta Oil Co's No. 2 Beaver Valley, commenced operations last Wednesday. This venture is located on tract 5218 near Mr. Braces mill.

The well on the Walters farm is down between 1400 and 1500 feet, with still a strong vein of gas. It will doubtless be ready to bring in by the latter part of this or the first of next week.

The rig-stuff for the Tubbs Run well is all on the ground, and the machinery will be there also when the rig is ready. A 250-barrel tank has been set, evidencing that the owners expect to make a strike.
