The Republican Primaries.

Republicans of Forest county, one week from next Saturday, June 30th, the primary election for the nomination of county officers and election of a delegate to the State convention, takes place. See to it that there is a good turn out in the different townships. There are also committeemen to elect in each precinct, and we want good, active Republicans for these places. There is very little or no contention for the different offices to be filled, and while it is hard to get out the vote on this account, it is perhaps all the better when it comes to the general election in November, as there will be no sores to heal up; nevertheless we want a good turn out at the primaries, and we hope our Republican friends will endeavor to get out as many votes as possible. Remember it is necessary that the officers of election are sworn according to an act of Assembly passed two years ago. Let us have a good showing.

Will the Patriot, while it is learnedly discoursing on "fair" apportionment bills, tell its readers if a bill which gives Northumberland county three members of the Legislature with a total population of 53,123 and contains many other such features, is a fair bill, or a constitutional bill? Please give some reason why 53,123 people in Northumberland Co. should have as many representatives as 74,681 people in Erie county. A full ratio for a member being 21,307, why is not Erie county, with 21,458 more population than Northumberland, entitled to one more member? Is it because Erie county elects Republican members, and Northumberland does not? Why is Dauphin county, with 76,148 population, treated in the same way? Is it for the same reason? Does not the editor of the Patriot feel

a little ashamed of himself preaching about "fairness" when these and other features of the Democratic apportionment bills, adopted by the House stare him in the face.—Harrisburg Telegraph.

The game law, as it finally passed at the House with the Senate amendments, extends the deer killing season to December 15. In the bill as introduced it cut the season off at December 1. We presume it has received the signature of the Governor. We have not observed who it is in the House who has taken the game law under his wing since the retirement of Mr. Wolf. We had hoped that we were rid of these tinkers. From October 1st to January 1st was a good law and it should not have been meddled with.

The above item from the Clearfield Journal shows how little the editor of that paper knows about game and game laws. He is evidently one of those who doesn't care how soon the deer are exterminated. By leaving the full month of December on the season it might as well be extended through the entire winter, so far as affording any protection to the deer is concerned. The true sportsman is disposed to give the deer a chance. The new law suits the people of Forest county first rate, only they would like very much to have had the full month taken off.

Death of Dukes.

Dukes, the murderer of Capt. Nutt, has bit the dust and his body now lies mouldering in the Uniontown cemetery. On Wednesday evening last James Nutt, eldest son of the murdered Captain, put four bullet holes into his carcase, three of which entered his body so close to his heart that a four-inch ring would have encircled the whole. Young Nutt has simply done that which the law failed to do. Dukes was acquitted of one of the foulest of murders, and while he had been warned repeatedly of his danger he persisted in staying in Uniontown, saying he would either live their or be a corpse in the cemetery; the latter place is now his "residence," and he will no longer sneer in young Nutt's face, as he has frequently done since the ending of the farce which set him free. Meanwhile James Nutt is in jail awaiting his trial, but whether a jury can be found in Fayette county that will find him guilty remains to be seen. Perhaps the one which acquitted Dukes might do it, but that is doubtless the only one. That jury said on their oaths that the miscreant Dukes, whose lips were reeking with the foul slanders of an innocent girl, and whose hands were red with the blood of her murdered father, was innocent of crime. Human nature will stand so much and so more. James Nutt submitted to all that mortal man should submit to, before he took the law in his own hands and rid society of the foul Dukes. The ring of the revolver which sent the villain Dukes writhing in the dust was the first healthy, satisfactory sound that has been heard in Uniontown in connection with the career of Dukes since he slew Captain Nutt in December last. It gave place for a healthier and higher tone in that community. Innocent, virtuous, girls and women can now walk the streets of that town without meeting the foul libertine and assassin Dukes. Fathers who attempt to defend the honor of their daughters in Uniontown need not fear hereafter that the hand of justice will be paralyzed by a packed jury. Young Nutt waited patiently and long for the law to vindicate itself and punish Dukes. The world knows the mockery of justice that was meted out to the family of the murdered Captain Nutt. Let those who blame James Nutt, put themselves in his place. Would you shoot?
