

D. 1885, it shall not be law-ful for any cows, heifers, or other horned cattle to be suffered to run at large in Tionesta Borough, between the hours of nine o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning, but the same shall be put up in stables or otherwise properly secured by the owners thereof, under a penalty of One Dollar for each and every animal so running at large contrary 15 this ordi-INSINCE.

shall be the duty of said officer after hav-ine given six days notice of the sale to sell said animal or animals in the usual manner of Constable's sale. The warrant for said sale to be made by the Burgess under his hand and seal, upon complaint or information of the High Constable aftersaid. Size, 3. The High Constable is hereby anthorized, in case of sale, to retain all le-gal costs, and collect the penalty aforesaid, in afficeses paying over the same to the
