The Republican State Convention which met in Harrisburg last Wednesday, did its work up promptly and well.

HARMONY REIGNS AGAIN.

The State Convention—Livsey for Treasury, Niles for Auditor General.

HARRISBURG, July 11.—But few persons other than the delegates were in the Opera House when the convention met.

On motion of Harry White, General Lemuel Todd, of Cumberland county, was elected temporary chairman.

Five secretaries were elected, when the convention proceeded to select members of committees on permanent organization and resolutions.

At 1 o'clock a recess was taken until 3, in order to give the committees time to prepare their reports.

After recess John Cessna was made permanent chairman. He congratulated the convention on the spirit of harmony shown.

The Republican party of Pennsylvania makes declaration of its principles as follows:

First—We unqualifiedly approve and demand the continuance of that system of protection to home industry which has proved itself to be the basis of national independence.

public treasury arising from a redundant revenue should after paying the national debt as fast as its conditions permits, be distributed from time to time to the several States.

Third—That, as the depreciated trade dollar is largely in the hands of our laboring people and is a disturbing element in the business of our country, we declare it to be the duty of Congress to adopt such legislation as will insure its full redemption and conversion into other coin for circulation.

Fourth—That we protest against the practice of foreign governments in aiding or enforcing the immigration of their paupers and criminal classes to this country.

Fifth—The Republicans of Pennsylvania most heartily endorse the wise and conservative administration of President Arthur and believe the policy of his administration has, under the circumstances, done much to secure the present happy and prosperous condition of the country.

Sixth—We heartily approve of the provision made by the Republicans in Congress for giving the patriot soldiers of the late war preference, according to qualifications, for positions under the government.

Seventh—We commend every effort to inaugurate a thorough and correct civil service reform in all departments of national and state administration.

Eighth—We require that all offices bestowed by either party shall be upon the sole basis of fitness, that competent and faithful officers shall not be removed except for cause and that the ascertained popular will shall be faithfully carried out by those holding office by favor of party.

Ninth—That the Republican party is unequivocally committed to an economical administration of the affairs of the Commonwealth; the abolition of all taxes not required for the necessities of the state government.

Tenth—That the Republican party of Pennsylvania hereby pledges itself to secure the passage of such legislation as will tend to a reform of the government of the state and its municipalities.

Eleventh—That the Democratic party in the Legislature of Pennsylvania is responsible for retarding the legitimate and necessary business of the Legislature causing the calling of an extra session at an expense of more than \$200,000.

Whereas It is the sense of this convention that the freest and full expression of Republican sentiment should be encouraged and sought in primary meetings, which are the foundation of party action and source of popular rule.

Resolved, That the state committee be instructed to inquire into the expediency of naming a uniform date throughout the state for the holding of primaries for the election of delegates to State Conventions.

Colonel Frank C. Bunnell, of Wyoming; C. H. Smiley, of Perry, Isaac McHose, of Berks; John Hill, of Indiana; S. Ely, of Bucks; J. A. M. Passmore, of Schuylkill; Willis J. Hulings, of Venango; J. A. Ege, of McKean, and William Livsey, of Allegheny, were placed in nomination for State Treasurer.

The ballot was as follows; Livsey, 140; Hulings, 73; Passmore, 22; Ege 5. Recess.

When the convention reassembled Niles, Vanderslice, Grimeson and Potts were placed in nomination for Auditor General.

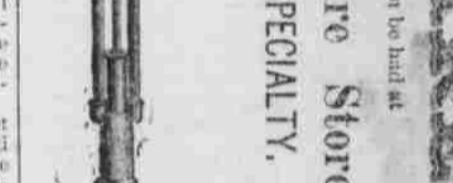
