LETTER OF INSTRUCTIONS. The Committee on contributions will be furnished with a subscription paper by the Adjutant and are duly appointed and hereby authorized to solicit subscriptions of provisions or money for said Re-union of the 83d Pa. Vols., and their comrades on Sept. 18, 1883.

They are expected to thoroughly canvass their district, arranging among themselves the part of their district they will individually attend to. They are instructed in taking subscriptions or contributions to have each person write their names, with a list of articles they respectively contribute opposite their names; this will enable the Central Committee, at Tionesta, to know exactly what is contributed in the way of substantial supplies, thereby satisfying the donor and the Post of the true application to the object and prevent any mistakes.

They will make return of their subscription papers by Sept. 10, next, to Capt. G. W. Clark, Q. M., Tionesta, Pa., at which time they will send all moneys collected. This will enable the Central Committee to know the extent of the contributions in provisions, etc., so they can frame their actions in accordance therewith. The Committee on subscriptions in their respective districts will see that the provisions contributed be delivered at Tionesta, on the grounds, by 10 A. M. on the day of the re-union.
