Laws of Game.

The following synopsis of the game iaws will doubtless be of interest to sportemen, who should cut it out and paste it in their bate:

Deer and elk-Can be hunted only between October 1st and December 15th. None to be offered for sale or had in possession out of season. Penalty fifty dollars.

Rabbits-Can be hunted from November 1st to January 1st. For hunting a rabbit out of season or having one in possession out of season the fine is \$5. For taken with ferrets the fine is \$10 for each rabbit so taken.

Squirrels-No person shall kill any grey, black or fox squirrel except from the first day of September to the first day of January. Penalty five

Woodcock--July 4th to January 1st The penalty for killing a bird out of season, or having in possession, killel or exposed to sale, \$10. For using a snare, trap or torchlight, or exposing to sale a woodcock, after taken in such way, \$10 for each bird.

Ducks and geese-No web-footed fowl shall be killedfexcept on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, from the 1st day of September to the 1st day of



Proclamation of General Election.

Whereas, in and by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled 'An Act to regulate the Elections of the Commonwealth, passed the 2d day of July, A. D., 1869, it is made the duty of the Sheriff of every county within this Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Elections, and in such to enumerate;

such to enumerate:

Ist, The officers to be elected.

2d. Designate the place at which the election is to be held.

I, C, W, CLARK, High Sheriff of the county of Forest, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the electors of the county of Forest, that a General Election will be held in said county, on

The act of Assembly entitled "an ac re-lating to the elections of this Common-lating to the elections of this Commonealth," passed July 2, 1819, provides as

follows, viz: "In case the person who shall have re-ceived the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as inspector in his place. And in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend, the person elected Judge shall appoint an inspector in his place, and in case the person elected Judge shall not attend, then the inspector who received the highest number of votes is at large in the large in his place. received the highest number of votes shall appoint a Judge in his place; and if any vacuatey snall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of the township, ward or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the place of election shall elect one of their number to fill such vacuatey.

I slso give official notice to the electors of Forest county, that by an act entitled "An Act further supplemental to the act relative to the election of this Common-

wealth, approved Jan. 30, 1874:"

Siz. 9. All the elections by the citizens shall be by ballot; every ballot voted shall be numbered in the order in which it shall be received, and the number recorded by the clerks on the list of voters opposite the name of the elector from whom received. And any voter voting two or more tickets the several tickets so voted shall each be numbered with the number correspondng with the number to the name of the voter. Any elector may write his name voter. Any elector may write his name upon his ticket, or cause the same to be written thereon, and attested by a citizen of the district. In addition to the oath now prescribed by law to be taken and subscribed by election officers, they shall severally be sworn or affirmed not to disclose how any elector shall have voted, unless required to do so as witnesses in a judicial processing. All indust inspectors clerks proceeding. All judges, inspectors, clerks and overseers of every election held under this act, shall, before entering upon their duties, be duly sworn or affirmed in the presence of each other. The judge shall be sworn by the minority inspector, if there shall be such minority inspector, if not, then by a justice of the peace or alderman, and the inspectors and clerk shall be sworn by the judge. Certificates of such swearing or affirming shall be duly made out and signed by the officers so sworn, and attested by the officer who administered the oath. If any judge or minority inspec-tor refuses or fails to swear the officers of election in the manner required by this act, or if any officer of election shall act without being duly sworn, or if any officer of election shall certify that any officer was sworn when he was not, it shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the efficer or officers so offending shall be fined not exceeding one theusand dollars. or imprisoned not exceeding one year, or both, in the discretion of the court.

Every person claiming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization cutfileate at produce his naturalization cerificate at the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person being received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word "voted," with the day, month and year; and if any election officer or officers shall receive a second vote on the same day, by virtue of same certificate, except where sons are entitled to vote because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the person whe shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdomeanor, and on conviction thereof, oner such second vote, shall be guity of a misdomeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each ease, nor the imprisonment one year, The like punishment shall be inflicted on conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement re-quired aforesaid on said naturalization

cortificate.

SEC. 12. If any election officer shall refuse or neglect to require such proof of the right of suffrage as is prescribed by this law, or laws to which this is a supplement from any person offering to vote ment, from any person offering to vote whose name is not on this list of assessed whose name is not on this list of assessed voters, or whose right to vote without requiring such proof, every person so offending shall, upon conviction, be suilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to undergo an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion 6.7 the court.

SUFFRAGE AND ELECTION.
SEC. I. Every male citizen twenty-or eyears of age, possessing the following
qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at

Second.—He shall have resided in the State one year, (or, if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed thereform

and returned, then six moths,) imme i-ately preceding the election. Third,—He shad have resided in the election district where he offers to vote at lesst two months immediately preceding

the election.

Fourth.—If twenty-two years of age or upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax which shall have been assessed at least two months and have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before election.

SEC. 2. The General election shall to held annually on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, but the General Assembly may, by law, fix a different day, two-thirds of all the members of each House consenting the reto.
