It shall be hawful for any quali-fied citizen of the district, notwithstand-ing the name of the proposed voter is con-tained on the list of resident taxables, to challenge the second tained on the list of resident taxables, to oballenge the vote of such person, where-upon the proof of the right of suffrage as is now required by law shall be publicly made and acted upon by the election board and the vote admitted or rejected, according to the evidence. Every person claiming to be a naturalized citizen shall be required to produce his naturalization certificate at produce his naturalization certificate at the election before voting, except where the election before voting, except where he has been for five years consecutively a voter in the district in which he offers to vote; and on the vote of such person be-ing received, it shall be the duty of the election officers to write or stamp on such certificate the word "voted," with the day, month and year; and if any election offi-cer or officers shall receive a record vote on the same day, by virtue of same cer-tificate, except where some are entitled to vote because of the naturalization of their fathers, they and the person who shall fathers, they and the person who shall offer such second vote, shall be guilty of a misdomeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, at the discretion of the court; but the fine shall not exceed five hundred dollars in machine machine the line shall not exceed five hundred dollars in each case, nor the imprisonment one year. The like punishment shall be inflicted on conviction on the officers of election who shall neglect or refuse to make or cause to be made the endorsement required aforesaid on said naturalization ertificate.

If any election officer shall re-fuse or neglect to require such proof of the right of suffrage as is prescribed by this haw, or haws to which this is a supple-ment, from any person offering to vote whose name is not on this list of assessed voters, or whose right to vote without re-uniting and here? quiring such proof, every person so of-fending shall, upon conviction, be suilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be sentenced for every such offense, to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or to unlerge an imprisonment of not more than one year, or both, at the discretion of the

Be it emacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Common-wealth of Pennsylvania in General As-sembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That the quai-ified voters of the soveral counties of this Communication and the soveral counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby bereatter authorized and required to vote by thereatter authorized and required to vote by thete's printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally clas-sified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for and shall be labeled "Judiciary (" one tickel anall embrace the names of all the State officers voted for and be hildeled "State;" one ticket shall embrace the nam s of all the county offices voted for, including office of Senator and member of Menuality office of Senator and member of Assemidy, if voted for, and member of Congress, if voted for, and be labeled "County 1" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the township officers voted for, and be labeled "Township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all the horongly officer voted for, and be labeled "Bor orth," and each class shall be de pos-tical using and balls. The act of Assembly entitled "an ac re-lating to the elections of this Common-wealth," passed July 2, 1819, provides as follows, viz: "In case the person who shall have re-ceived the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for supperformance of the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall at as inspector in his place. 

And any voter voting two or more tickets the several tickets so voted shall each be numbered with the number correspond-ing with the number to the name of the voter. Any elector may write his name upon his ticket, or cause the same to be written thereon, and attested by a citizen of the district. In addition to the oath now prescribed by law to be taken and sub-scribed by election officers, they shall sov-erally be sworn or affirmed not to disclose how any elector shall have voted, unless required to do so as witnesses in a ludicial proceeding. All judges, inspectors, clorks und overseers of every election held under this act, shall, before entering upon their duties, be duly sworn or affirmed in the presence of each other. The judge shall be sworn by the minority inspector, if there shall be such minority inspector, if not, then by a justice of the peace or alderman, and the inspectors and clork shall be sworn by the judge. Certificates of such swear-ing or affirming shall be duly made out and signed by the officers so sworn, and attested by the officer who administered the oath.
