Another Land-Mark Gone.

Amza Purdy was born in Steuben county, N. Y., October 10, 1808. He came to Venango (now Forest) county with his father in 1826, the family settling at what is now known as Oldtown, Tionesta township, where they resided for several years. It was here where Amza made the acquaintance of Miss Lucy Phelps, then a young lady near his own age, to whom he was married in 1838. He has been a recident of the county ever since, excepting about a year and a half. About sixteen years ago he sold his farm at the mouth of Ross Run and moved to Chantauqua county, N. Y., and from thence he went to Kansas, where he remained one winter, and then returned to this county, bought a farm in Green township, and has resided there ever since, something like fifteen years.

Mr. Purdy had been rather a robust man until within the last year or two, when his health began to fail rapidly. He attended the last election, in November, which was about the last act of importance he was able to perform. For about four weeks he had been confined to his bed. Although suffering much during his. confinement his last hours seemed very peaceful, and he passed away without a struggle at about two o'clock in the morning of Friday Dec. 14, 1883. His aged wife survives him.

Mr. Purdy has ever been one of our best citizens, and no more honorable, straight-forward, upwright man ever lived in our midst. He was highly respected by all who knew him, and particularly so by those who have known him the longest. He has truly "borne, without abuse, the grand old name of Gentleman."

The funeral occurred on Sabbath last, his remains being interred in the Evangelical Cemetery on Dutch Hill A large concourse of old friends and 71. neighbors attended the last sad rites.
