THE determination of the Democrats to carry the district of the (late) Hon. Dudley C. Haskell, of Kansas, was announced with an extraordinary floorish of trumpets. Free Trade Tinkers.

The bill introduced in Congress by Mr. Morrison, chairmau of Ways and Means committee, and who represents the Democratic majority of that body, he being the immediate friend of Speaker Carlilse, representing that geutleman's views on the tariff question, proposes placing all kinds of lumber on the free list, opening our markets to the free competion of the world. The present tariff on lumber in its different shapes is as follows, and the bill proposes to remove this tax:

Timber, hown and sawed, and timber used for spars and in building wharves 30 per cent ad valorem.

Timber, squared or sided, not especially enumerated or provided for in this act, one cent per cubic foot.

Sawed boards, plank, deals and other lumber of hemlocks, white woods, sycamore and bass wood, one dollar per one thousand feet, board measure, all other articles of sawed lumber, two dollars per one thousand feet, board measure. But when lumber of any sort is planed or finished. in addition to the rate herein provided there shall be levied and paid for each tide so planed or finished, 50

Aud if planed on one side and tougued and grooved, \$1 per one thous and feet board measure.

And if planed on two sides, and tongued and grooved, \$1.50 per one thousand feet, board measure.




