A Hybrid Tree.

A few days ago Dr. Halderman was examining the timber on his tract of land in Forest county, which adjoins the Warren county line, and discovered a tree that is a curiosity and puzzle to naturalists, in the shape of a pine and hemlock tree growing from one stump. The stump or base of the tree is about five feet through or fifteen feet in circumference, and the forks of the tree are about six feet from the ground. The line of demarcation between the two trees springing from the same stump can only be traced with the eye by the difference in the wood, one-half of the stump being hemlock and the other of pine. Each of the trees is fully two feet in diameter, equal in size and about eighty feet high. The joint trees stand on the top of a hill just

below the Warren county line, above Samuel Davidson's Mill, a short distance below the mouth of Queen Creek, where it joins Hickory. In a thickly settled country this tree would be a great curiosity.
