The Directors Convention.

The School Directors of Forest county met in Convention in the Court House in Tionesta, on May 6th, 1884, for the purpose of electing a Superintendent of Schools of Forest county for the term of three years. Supt. Hillard called the convention to order and stated the object of the meeting. A. B. Kelly of Tionesta, was elected President of the convention, and T. D. Collins of Green, J. H. Dingman of Tionesta, and C. C. Smith of Howe, were elected Secretaries. Upon calling the roll by the President, fifty directors answered to their names.

Nominations being declared in order the following were made: Edward Klabbatz of Howe nominated J. E. Hilliard.

C. A. Hill of Hickory nominated Miss J. E. Copeland. Levi Pearson of Kingsley nominated F. F. Whittekin.

H. S. Brockway of Tionesta nominated George W. Kerr.

Before taking a vote a motion was made by Mr. James Cole of Jenks, seconded by Mr. John Peterson of Harmony, that all spectators and candidates be excluded from the room. The motion was opposed in pointed remarks by Messrs. Collins, G. W. Zentz, G. W. Robinson, G. J. Lacy, and Edward Klabbatz; the latter gentleman making a special plea for the press representatives. The motion was lost by a decisive majority and the decision was loudly cheered by the audience.

Then came the balloting for candidates. The audience was silent until nearly all the names were called, each Director pronouncing his choice aloud, when the people began to get restive, knowing by that time that a choice had been made on the first ballot. A loud cheer went up as the result was announced. The ballot resulted as follows: Mr. Hillard 31, Miss Copeland 13, Mr. Kerr 4, Mr. Whittekin 1. The convention immediately adjourned.

OIL NOTES.

Grandin & Kelly's No. 21, which was completed last week, has been making an average of about 200 barrels a day.

The Derrick says Grandin & Kelly's No. 23 at Balltown, which was completed last month, started off after being shot at about 150 barrels, but rapidly declined to a small producer. Grandin No. 24 was drilled into the sand and is showing for about five barrels. These two wells cut off the extension in that direction, though good wells may be obtained further west on the same line.

The rig of the Tionesta Oil Co's well on Council Run is about completed, and the machinery will be placed forthwith. Drilling will probably begin about the first of the week.
