OIL NOTES.

Saturday's Derrick gives the following account of the Agnew well, the largest which has been struck in the Balltown district for several months. "Emery & Agnew's well on 3,195 was drilled into the sand to-day and is reported as starting at 33 barrels per hour. Its location is south of the Gartlan producers in the northeast corner of the same tract, and northeast of the old Porcupine well. No. 1, known as the "Good Friday" well. From its being a large producer it looks as if there was another spor running in that direction from the Balltown District. It is a quarter of a mile southeast of the Porcupine, No. 7, dry hole."

We learn that the estimate of the Derrick is considerably under estimated. The well started at the rate of 58 barrels per hour, and at last accounts was doing 50 barrels. The drill has penetrated the sand only about four feet. The 92 acres on which this well is located is a part of several hundred acres owned by Proper & Agnew, and is a lot chosen by Judge Proper as a reserve for himself and Agnew when there were several thousand acres to select from.
