When Jefferson county was made a separate Judicial District, under the Judicial apportionment bill of 1881, Mr. White received the nomination for President Judge of that District, but within a few days after his nomination the Governer vetoed the bill, and that county again became a part of the 18th Judicial District, over which Judge Knox now

Mr. White is the architect of his own fortune, and in the sweat of his face laid the foundation of his success. He is an able lawyer, is popular at home; and has the ability requisite for a Representative in Congress.
