THE Democratic papers claimed that less than 20,000 majority in Maine would be virtual defeat for the Republicans, and they expected all the time that it would not reach 5,000. Well, the returns are all in now, and the majority is nearly 21,000. That ought to settle their hash. Now for Ohio and West Virginia!

WHEN Senator Grady publishes the evidence upon which he based his charge that Cleveland, as Governor, took bribes for vetoing certain measures, the Adirondacks will again furnish an abiding place for the "moral" candidate.

TAMMANY HALL has saved its regularity and vindicated its sincerity by supporting Cleveland in the letter of its resolution and opposing him in the spirit of its address. With an eye on the doors of future state conventions, it runs up the Democratic colors, and, with an eye on the November ballot-boxes, it refuses to deposit there any Democratic ballots. Such action cuts the Democratic vote of New York City in two in the middle and leads half of it away, a mass of organized bolters. No Democratic paper will pretend to conceal its fears over this action; but most of them will affect a hope and assume a belief that the loss of Democratic votes will be made up by Republican bolters. Unfortunately for this theory, the size of the "silent vote" which is supposed to be skulking around with a Democratic ballot concealed in the nethermost depths of its prejudices has had its chance to stand up and be counted in Maine, and it was not counted because it didn't stand up. It will not in New York. The fight is one between the old parties, and Tammany Hall shaves off Democratic chances in New York City and ruins them in the state.—Phila. Press.

If that Republican majority in Maine keeps on growing, somebody will get up and move to make it unanimous.

WHEN Governor Cleveland emerged from the Adirondacks recently, at Plattsburg, and while the guest of Smith M. Weed, he was given a serenade. In the speech he made on that occasion he said: "I find my ideas of the resources of the State much enlarged by having seen your iron-bearing mountains, and by having enjoyed your pleasant climate." While the possibility that his ideas could be enlarged is not new to any one who has read his letter of acceptance, the discovery that it can be done by a "pleasant climate" is one that should be reported to the British Association at Montreal.

THE numerous Democratic editor who was demanding 20,000 majority in Maine while he knew it wouldn't reach 5,000, is now kicking himself because he didn't follow the New York Herald, and insists that if the majority didn't clump up to 32,000 he would call it a Republican defeat.

—Let every Republican see that his State and County taxes are paid.

Tammany Hall and Cleveland

At the Tammany Hall meeting the Hon. John Kelly said that the organization would support Cleveland. In the New York Star, the recognized organ of Mr. Kelly and Tammany Hall, in the same number in which appears an account of the meeting appears the following editorial:

At the same time we cannot deny that Butler's candidacy is likely to prove fatal to Cleveland's chances, because of the strong Democratic following the old soldier attracts; nor is Democratic defeat under such circumstances the less painful and humiliating because not necessarily prostrating. But the Chicago Convention invited defeat when it nominated Governor Cleveland on a platform of falsehoods and feebleness, and what has followed is the natural result of repudiating principles and services in favor of policy and availability. Now, if Butler should prove the real Moses who is to lead the Democratic party out of the wilderness, every vote for him would be a step nearer the promised land.

In the same issue, a member of Tammany Hall, who signs himself a "Jackson Democrat," writes as follows:

"From the position that Tammany Hall now occupies the organization has it now in its power to serve the Democratic party by securing the election of one of our able leaders to the Presidency. When they meet Monday night let them declare that the time has arrived when the voice of the people shall be heard in the councils of the party. That the nomination of Grover Cleveland was one unfit to be made, that there is no chance for his election, and that the time has now arrived when the public demand that he be withdrawn from the canvass, and a noble and pure Democratic statesman be substituted in his place. Mr. Hendricks would doubtless see the propriety of following suit; such a course would enable the National Committee to place in the field such a ticket as Thurman and Slocum. Butler would at once retire from the field, and we should have such a sweeping victory as has not been known since the election of Franklin Pierce, and the credit of it would be attributed to the grand old Tammany organization. Should the Democratic managers fail to heed such a warning from such a source, the blame would be upon them and not on us. It is two months before the election. There is plenty of time to make this change and secure such result. That it may be done is the fervent wish of thousands like myself, who has always been a Jackson Democrat.

Again it says that while Mrs. Parnell admires Cleveland, she is of the opinion that,

"The members of the Irish National party are mostly in favor of Blaine, and it looks as if the Clan-na-Gael would go over to him in a body." According to her estimate, the defection in the Irish-American circles is really more extensive than most people had supposed.

The moral campaign of Cleveland has fallen flat. The majority of the so-called Independents feel that they have been cheated and every day brings some new evidence that the vote for Cleveland from that source will be very small. Upon this the Star says:

As Governor Cleveland ponders on the multiplying coolness of the Independents how he must dwell—if he knows them—on those touching and expressive lines:

I never nursed a dear gazelle
To glad me with its soft black eye,
That when it came to know me well
And love me, it was sure to die.

Taking these things together we conclude that Tammany Hall is for Cleveland and the Tammany voter for everybody but Cleveland.

THE Greenback papers in Iowa are deserting the fusion movement in that state, and refusing to follow General Weaver into the Democratic camp. The attempt to sell out the Greenback party is denounced bitterly.

Up in Maine the people seem to believe that Senator Grady knows what he is talking about when he accuses Cleveland of being bribed.

IS IT not time the Democratic papers were hedging on the Maine election? It will be remembered that it was they, and not the Republicans who insisted that the result there was to be indicative of the result in the country in November. Tuesday morning they rejoiced in the assertion that Maine gave a cold day for Blaine because the majority was only twelve thousand. More complete returns show that it is really about twenty-one thousand. Are they ready to take in their flags and postpone the election of a Democratic President until 1888?

It is said that Republican campaign work is better organized in Wisconsin than in almost any other State in the Union. An immense quantity of judicious literature is being circulated there, and the letters received at headquarters show great interest and activity all over the State. Chairman Taylor hopes to reclaim three Congressional districts, besides giving a handsome majority for the Republican National and State tickets.

TAMMANY'S endorsement of the democratic ticket is something like the weather, since the cold wave got here.—The Tammany leaders in their address to the democratic party keep one eye on Governor Cleveland's record while endorsing him.—Oil City Blizzard.
