Tuesday evening about 5 o'clock, a very serious accident, resulting in the death of Clarence Lithgo, occurred at Reck's Mill, in Jenks Township. He was engaged as setter and had only recovered from an accident met with in nearly the same way, and went to work Monday. A smail hemlock log riage was gigged back rapidly, the log slipped on the blocks bringing one of the dogs in contact with the saw. The dog was jerked off and a piece of it about a foot long struck Lithgo above the left eye cutting a gash four inches long and knocking him backwards off the carriage on the back of his head. He was picked up, doctor sent for, and all done for him that could be done by the men at the mill. The doctor arrived about 7 o'clock and dressed the wounds, but Litbgo never spoke, and died Wednesday about noon. He leaves a wife and one child.
