Colorado 3, California 8, Illinois 22, Iowa 13, Kansas 9, Maine 6, Massachusetts 14, Minnesota 7, Nebraska 5, Ohio 23, Pennsylvania 30, Rhode Island 4, Vermont 4, Wisconsin 11, Nevada 3, New Hampshire 4, Oregon 3, New York 36, Michigan 1. Total 206.

The electors in Michigan are divided, Cleveland getting 6, Butler 6, and Blaine 1.

Washington Letter.

Notwithstanding the excitement occasioned by but four weeks remain before the assembling of Congress. The city emerged from her long summer siesta some time ago to have her attention distracted by the problem of the presidency, but now that the end of the contest has come, there has begun in Washington a busy, bustling era of preparation for the advent of assembled wisdom at the Capitol.

Not infrequently does the House of Representatives await a quorum until its members can be arrested in the enjoyment of the mazes of Terpsichore and returned captive by the Sergeant-at-Arms. The monarchs of this power—the society leaders—continually strain every nerve to increase its magnetism, and the promise for this season a succession of entertainments on a scale that has not heretofore been attempted.

A walk about the city surprises the summer absentee, and expressions of astonishment are heard on all sides at the transformations effected during their absence. In rapid improvement Washington is perhaps the most remarkable city in the world. Each year the magic hand of the builder works surprises in new designs of brick stone, and murtar. New streets are opened and paved with asphalt. Vast public buildings are reared. Dreary wastes of ground are metamorphosed into verdant parks. The District Government that has done so much to make the Capital the pride of the American people, has not been idle all summer. Its energy is especially manifest by new asphalt pavements, and the improvements upon Washington's parks; and the little triangular green patches, which form wherever the oblique avenues cross the right-angled streets, also indicate much care and cultivation.

Washington is happy in another improvement. The howl of the office seeker is nearly inaudible. This strange, hopeful variety of the genus homo we have always with us. He does not migrate with the rest of Washingtonians for a summer holiday, but plies his vocation the year round. He formally made life unendurable to the President and the heads of the departments. No amount of vigilance thwarted his bold designs. But he is at last conquered by the horrors of the rigid competitive examination. He shrinks from the frowns of the civil service measures. The majority of this recently formidable army are awed into complete absence, but the most daring of the great hungry horde still loiter around and feebly howl their presence.

Much attention is now directed toward the Washington Monument, as it approaches completion. The tall white marble shaft may already be seen from almost any part of the city, and soon the question of the grand dedication ceremonies will be mooted.
