Boiler Explosion.

The Boiler of the Potter mill, half a mile from Pineville corners, this county, blew up Wednesday afternoon, resulting in the probable death of one man, Albert LeBarron, aged about ninteen years. Particulars learned are as follows: The boiler house was situated on one side and adjoining the mill proper. The boiler was a twoflue thirty-five horse power. Young LeBarron was standing in front of the boiler, when the flues collapsed, blowing the rear sheet through a brick wall and landing it twenty-five or thirty rods away in the woods. Evidently this rear sheet gave out first, as in addition to the blowing away of sheet, the entire boiler was sent ahead out of the arch three or four feet more than its length. But at the same time the front flue sheet was also torn out, striking and following the young man through a board partition, and both landing nearly fifty feet from the starting point, where they were found nears vary slight.

Dr. Acomb went out to the scene of the disaster, finding the unfortunate man still alive, but stffering from a fracture of the skull over the left eve and a number of bad cuts on the head.
