#### Funeral of the Rev. O. B. Clark.

The Jamestown Evening Journal gives the following particulars of the funeral of the late Chaplain Clark:

At 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon a very large number of friends and relatives of the late Chaplain O. B. Clark had gathered at the family residence on East Fifth street, to attend the funeral. A choir composed of Mrs. Kirkland, Mrs. George, B. A. Barlow and George R. Butts; Miss Barlow, organist, sang Nearer My God To Thee, following which the Rev. W. L. Hyde read from the scriptures. The funeral address was delivered by the Rev. J. Peate, and was the appreciative and just offering of a friend, fellow Christian and fellow chaplain. After this touching address, the Rev. Mr. Chase, of Sherman, offered prayer, and the services at the house were concluded by the choir singing Asleep in Jesus.

The pleasant weather induced many to walk to the cemetery to witness the Grand Army of the Republic ceremonies. The casket with its covering of flowers was almost hidden by an American flag from the time it was removed from the house until it was lowered into the grave. The procession that proceeded to Lake View cemetery was a long one. The ministers rode in a carriage at the head, following them being a guard of honor of eight comrades of Post Brown, under command of Officer of the Day John Conway, all uniformed and carrying rifles. The bearers walked on either side of the hearse and were as follows: Comrades Con. Moynihan, James Young, E. R. Jones, H. Smith, 2d, E. L. Homer, B. F. Harkness, O. M. Davis and B. F. Townley. About eighty veterans marched next, in two lines, under command of W. T. Bradshaw, commander of Post Brown; of the number eighteen being from Post Sturdevant, C. B. Sturdevant, commander, Kennedy, and the remainder being from Post Brown. Each veteran wore a badge of crape, and the colors were tied with the same material. A long line of carriages containing relatives and family friends formed the rear section of the

After the evergreen-trimmed grave had been surrounded by the mourners and the veterans, Commander Bradshaw opened the G. A. R. ceremony by reading from the ritual and calling upon Chaplain Hyde to offer prayer, after which the choir chanted, Rest Weary Head. A piece of evergreen, symbol of undying of purity; a sprig of laurel, symbol of victory were next laid upon the casket by comrades, each of whom recited an appropriate selection from the ritual. Chaplain Hyde next made a brief and fitting address and the ceremony was closed by the benediction pronounced by Chaplain
