RULES GOVERNING THE REPUBLI-CAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS OF FOREST COUNTY.


1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one 1. The candidates for the several offices shall have their names announced in one or more of the county papers at least three weeks previous to the Primary Meetings stating the office, and subject to the action of the party at the said primary meetings. 2. The voters belonging to the Republican party in each township and borough, shall meet on a day to be designated by the County Committee, at the usual place of holding spring elections, at 2 o'clock P. M., and proceed to elect one person for Judge, and two persons for Clerks who shall form a Board of Elections to receive votes and determine who are the proper persons to vote, and who shall hold the polls are opened, the candidates announced shall be balloted for; the name of each person yoing shall be written on a list at the time of voting, no person being allowed to vote more than once for the same office. he is crowded with callers. 
