Knew It Was Loaded.

A Gusher City, Forest county, correspondence to the Warren Mirror of last Saturday gives the following correct account of a shooting accident of which we made brief mention last week :

A very serious shooting accident occurred at Anchor City, a half mile day of this week a party of five had completed arrangements for a bunt, all heavily armed with Winchester rifles. When it was nearly daylight a start was made. Mr. Logue stepped Gilson, who was seated on a bench, that his gun was cocked. Gilson attempted to lower the hammer and at that instant Mr. Irvine Kitlinger, who was seated on a log back and to the left of Gilson about six feet, stepped in range of the weapon when it was discharged. Mr. Kitlinger retreated to the log and it was apparent to all that he had received the charge. He was carried to his residence, about ten rods distant. Dr. Pryor was dispatched for and arrived from Garfield about three hours later. In the meantime Mr. McBride, a medical ing to the comfort of the injured man. The following disgnosis of Kitlinger will be found nearly correct. The ball, which was 45-75 Winchester, took effect about 31 inches below the knee of the right leg, striking the Tibia bone and carrying part of it away, then passed through the Gastrocnemis and Soleus mucles; lacerating them and other members of the calf of the leg in a shocking manner. The bullet then passed through the left leg, inflicting an ugly wound in the calf but doing no injury to the boue. Dr. Pryor dressed the wounds and rendered the sofferer as comforta-ble as possible. His opinion is that Kitlinger will get along nicely, but on
