THE Congressmen who go to Washington, says the Phila. Record, to farm out Federal offices as much out of place and proper subjects for Executive displeasure as the cattle men who are pasturing their herds on forbidden ground.

ACCORDING to the Cleveland organs Higgins is too small for an issue, and so is Pillsbury, and so is Manning, and so is Whitney, and so is Jones, and so is Barbierre, and so is the wholesale sweep of postmasters. What a very small affair this administration is after all.

MR. WHITNEY, Mr. Cleveland's Secretary of the Navy, is a son-in-law of a magnate of the Standard Oil Company, and consequently rolls in wealth. He is not in a position to sympathize with men out of employment. If it were otherwise he would have hesitated to close up the great ship-building works of John Roach, and thereby throw thousands of working men out of employment.

MR. MORRISON has been interviewed in relation to proposed tariff legislation, but the interviewer seems to have got but little satisfaction. The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee says that the party must stand by their pledges of last Fall, which, from the Morrisonian standpoint, means a reduction of tariff all round.

SENATOR LONGENECKER, the lead competitor of Col. Quay for the State Treasury nomination, has been re-elected Chairman of the Republican Committee of Bedford county. Under his leadership Blaine carried Bedford last year, a county which has from time-out-of mind been Democratic, and the Senator writes to the State Committee that he has now strong hopes of carrying it for Col. Quay—that the Republicans there are thoroughly united and in earnest. They are determined to show their condemnation of both National and State Democratic Administrations. News comes from all quarters that a like spirit animates the Republicans, and unless all signs fail they will move with solid front and achieve a greater victory in Pennsylvania than has ever been known to an off year.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15, '85. The rapidity with which Assistant Postmaster General Stevenson is removing republican postmasters and filling the vacancies with democrats is causing some anxiety among the mugwumps. But it is not reasonable to expect the democratic party to let fifty thousand post offices of the country remain in republican hands. These offices are not covered by the civil service rules, and it has been announced that the administration will not extend the scope of the rules at this time. Theorists who go to extremes may denounce a policy that looks like compromising with "spoils," but great reforms move slowly, and they can only move at all when sustained by public sentiment. If it appears that the classified civil service has survived a change of party and is established on a basis that lifts it above the mutations of politics, that will be an immense stride forward.

It is a familiar trick of politicians and others to sign all applications for office presented to them, even if they know the office-seeker is unworthy, and then resort, if need be, to private representations, in order that the appointment be not made. By this means they avoid making an enemy

of the candidate, and, at the same time, secure the failure of his hopes. To judge from the stinging rebuke which President Cleveland administers to one of this tribe, he regards such duplicity as a heinous crime, which should, by rights, bring one to the penitentiary. Doubtless the President has suffered greatly in the way described, and so writes with feeling.

The State department may now have another Kelley, on its hands in the person of James Whalen, who was recently appointed consul at Fort Erie, opposite Buffalo. Whalen, it appears, was an active Fenian in the 1866 episode, and on that account is very obnoxious to the Canadian government. A British diplomatic agent has been working on the case, and, it is said, he has advised Whalen's rejection on his record. In that case the State Department may have a delicate task ahead of it. Whalen is a Buffalo man, a personal acquaintance of President Cleveland, and well esteemed in the community.

The clerks in the government departments after some hesitation have begun to ask for their annual leaves of absence, and are now going away in great numbers. Very few leaves were asked for up to the first of the present month, but since that date they are granted with no hesitation. The apprehension that existed in regard to sweeping changes is not so manifest as it was, and in consequence the clerks are following the usual custom in regard to annual leaves.

The special delivery service which goes into operation on the first of October should prove a great public convenience. In most cases it will shorten the delivery of letters a whole day. The new undertaking trenches somewhat on the field of private enterprise, but it is clearly within the legitimate functions of the department. The success of the scheme from the revenue standpoint is doubtful, but the leading motive on the postal service is not profit to the government but the public convenience. L.

ATTENTION VETERANS!

The following is the substance of a circular received at Head Quarters of Capt. George Stow Post:

The North Western Association of the G. A. R. will hold its first Grand Army Day in the city of Erie, on Sept. 9, and 10, and the veterans of the following Regiments of Pa., will hold their Annual Reunion at that time, viz: the 83d, 111th, and 145th, Pa. Vols. It is expected to be the largest gathering of old "War Veterans" ever held in Western Pa. The railroads entering Erie give the following rates over their lines good for coming on the 8, 9, and 10, and returning up to and including the 14th, thus giving an opportunity of remaining Sunday in Erie if desired: Rates on Phila. & Erie R. R., 2 cents a mile. Hotels have given reduced rates ranging from \$1 to \$2.50 per day; meals 25 to 50 cents. A committee will provide accommodations and locate comrades on their arrival, and wish to know how many are coming and what rates they wish to pay so hotel proprietors can make arrangements accordingly. The program of arrangements will probably be as follows:

Afternoon and evening of the 9th devoted to reception and locating of comrades. On the forenoon of the 10th, the 83d, 111th, and 145th Reg's, and the North Western Grand Army Association will hold their annual business sessions. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon of the 10th there will be a grand parade of all old soldiers, after which they will proceed to the dock and take boats for the head of Presque Isle Bay, where a Grand Re-union and Camp fire will be held during the afternoon and evening. Other announcements may be hereafter made of particulars and will be announced by the officers of Stow Post in our papers.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION proposed to the citizens of this Commonwealth for their approval or rejection by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Published by order of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, in pursuance of the 1st section of Article XVIII of the Constitution.

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania: Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, that the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

AMENDMENT.

That section five of article five of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which reads as follows: "Whenever a county shall contain forty thousand inhabitants it shall constitute a separate judicial district, and shall elect one judge learned in the law; and the General Assembly shall provide for additional judges, as the business of said districts may require. Counties containing a population less than is sufficient to constitute separate districts shall be formed into convenient single districts, or, if necessary, may be attached to contiguous districts as the General Assembly may provide. The office of associate judge, not learned in the law, is abolished in counties forming separate districts; but the several associate judges in office when this Constitution shall be adopted shall serve for their unexpired terms, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows: Whenever a county shall contain sixty thousand inhabitants it may constitute a separate judicial district, and may elect one judge learned in the law; and the General Assembly shall provide for additional judges, as the business of said districts may require. Counties not forming separate districts, shall be formed into convenient single districts, as the General Assembly may provide. The office of associate judge, not learned in the law, is abolished in counties forming separate districts and having more than one law judge; every other county shall elect two associate judges, who shall not be required to be learned in the law; but the several associate judges in office, when this amendment shall be adopted, shall serve for their unexpired terms.
