Mr. Kelly is such a confoundedly cross-eyed politician when he is in good condition and lively, that none of them can guess where he is going to strike when he hauls off with his hammer.

He is the smallest and weakest man who has been in the executive chair of New York since Myrom Clark's day before the war, and with a good candidate the Republicans ought to have no difficulty in beating him.—Phila. It may be taken for granted that the Republican senators will not merely pass upon the President's appointments, but will inquire into their character and fitness. They will not pursue a factious and obstructive course; they will treat the Administration with fairness and liberality; but where removals have been made without cause and appointments made without merit, and both on false grounds so that the public interests have suffered, the Republican senators will exercise their prerogative of reviewing the action. WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, the county seat of Fayette county, Ohio, a wealthy town of about five thousand people, was almost literally wiped out by a cyclone on Wednesday night. The storm seemed to start at Seymour, Ind., passing Cambridge city and Dublin in the same state and Tippecanoe and Dayton, Ohio, not being particularly destructive until it reached Washington and Bloomingburg where its force appears to have been spent. The loss of life does not appear to have been great, though wonderful stories are told of families carried various distances and safely landed, while nothing was left of the houses they had been in. The loss of property is estimated at \$1,000,000. When will the philosophy of the cyclone be comprehended?

THERE is a growing feeling in this country that the British press wants the earth. Their Presidential ticket was elected in this country last year, and a party was put in power which is hostile to the selfish American doctrine of protection to American industry yet the British press grows because Vice President Hendricks says a good word that means nothing, for the Irish Nationalists. Are they not just a little greedy? Or does the contract between them and the American free traders, in their estimation, involve a complete surrender by the Democrats, of everything; even to personal freedom of speech—even, beguiling speech—like the Vice President's?

SENATOR SHERMAN delivered another speech yesterday in Ohio, in which he ventured to refer to and denounce the crime against the ballot which prevails in the majority of the Southern states. It will now be in order for the entire Mugwump and Democratic press, especially the Mugwump, to join in a chorus of derision and cry "bloody shirt." The dough-face element which for half a century insisted that no one should speak disrespectfully of slave-holders or slavery seems to be again coming to the front in the North, and is seeking to cry down those who see ought to condemn in the conspiracy against human rights by which half the people of the South are systematically disfranchised.—Phila. AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION proposed to the citizens of this Commonwealth for their approval or rejection by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Published by order of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, in pursuance of the 1st section of Article XVIII of the Constitution.

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, that the following is proposed as an amendment of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

AMENDMENT. That section five of article five of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which reads as follows: "Whenever a county shall contain forty thousand inhabitants it shall constitute a separate judicial district, and shall elect one judge learned in the law; and the General Assembly shall provide for additional judges, as the business of the said districts may require. Counties containing a population less than is sufficient to constitute separate districts shall be formed into convenient single districts, or, if necessary, may be attached to contiguous districts as the General Assembly may provide. The office of associate judge, not learned in the law, is abolished in counties forming separate districts and having more than one law judge; every other county shall elect two associate judges, who shall not be required to be learned in the law; but the several associate judges in office, when this amendment shall be adopted, shall serve for their unexpired terms.
